At a meeting of the Democratic County Committee, of Prince William county, held in the courthouse, Monday, there were present the following:

Tuesday afternoon, Mr. Lorimer C. Graham, vice-president of the Andrew B. Graham Company of Washington, and Miss Elsa B. next to the youngest daughter of the late Robert Porter of Manassas, went quietly to Baltimore, with the secret of their intentions well guarded, and were married in the Cathedral in that city, Father P. C. Gavan performing the marriage ceremony.

Upon motion of Mr. Lynne, Mr. J. P. Manuel was nominated and elected chairman. Upon like motion, Mr. D. J. Arrington was elected secretary of the committee.

It appearing there were several vacancies in the committee, the following gentlemen were elected to fill the vacancies: Messrs. A. A. Hooff, of Calles district; J. B. Toole, of Lees district; and D. E. Eppert, of Brentsville district.

POSTAL SAVINGS BANKS

Statement Showing Amount Deposited—Systems to be Extended—3,923 Accounts.

Postmaster-General Hitchcock announced Monday, the total number of depositors and total amount of money on deposit at the forty-eight postal savings banks February 23, 1911. Since these depositaries began operation on January 3, 3,923 accounts have been opened and 6,861 separate depositors were made for an average amount of \$21.50. During this period only 259 accounts have been drawn out or closed, making the total number of open accounts on February 23, 3,664. The net amount on deposit at these offices, after two months' operation, is \$133,500. At this ratio the deposits at the forty-eight offices, after one year's operation, will amount to \$808,214. The total population of the forty-eight towns in which depositary offices have been established is only about 300,000. If the postal savings system should be patronized in the same proportion when it is established at all money order post-offices, the total amount on deposit, after one year's operation, will be about \$200,000,000.

Postmaster-General Hitchcock is engaged now in preparing for the establishment of 260 additional postal savings banks, an appropriation of \$500,000 having been made by the recent Congress for the extension of the system. The list of cities in which the banks are to be located, probably will be announced in the near future.

The depositary at Leadville, Col., is the leading office, in regard to the amount on deposit. That office has 362 open accounts and a total deposit of \$21,253, making an average balance, per depositor, of \$58.71. North Carolina is thirty-third in the list, having twenty-seven accounts, with a total deposit of \$792, an average of \$29.33 per depositor. Virginia's rank is forty-seventh, next to the last, the office at Clifton Forge having twenty-seven accounts, with a total deposit of \$245, or an average of \$9.07. South Carolina is at the bottom of the list, there being only eight open accounts, with a total of \$180 on deposit, an average of \$22.50.

GRANT EXTENSION OF TIME

Farago County Treasurer Herrell Allowed 120 Days' Suspension of Decree.

At a meeting of the board of supervisors of Prince William county, held on Saturday, 18th inst., an extension of 120 days' time was granted to former county treasurer, Jas. E. Herrell, in which to finish copying the record and other preparations necessary in his appeal from the decision of Judge Barley, in the case of the board of supervisors vs. Herrell, rendered on the 27th day of last December. Following is the text of the order granting the extension of time:
