Though the burden of grief which overwhelms the remnant of a once happy home is heavy and the future is viewed through a veil of tears, let the sorrowing wife and mother and the bereaved and devoted son take comfort in the thought that God's dispensations are born of wisdom that we see, faith and strength we view His acts through "a glass darkly, we shall sometime understand."

DATE FOR RIXEY'S TRIAL

The Accused Banker Resolved Monday Trial Set for September 18th.

Learning upon the news of his physicians after being advised from his automobile, C. Joseph Rixey appeared before the corporation court in Alexandria Monday morning, in answer to indictments charging him with irregularities in the sum of \$30,000 in connection with the funds of the Virginia Safe Deposit and Trust Corporation.

The hearing lasted for an hour, during which case Mr. Rixey's physicians found it necessary to administer stimulants at frequent intervals, to their apparently unimpaired patient.

The banker's attorneys contested, vigorously, every step in the proceedings, especially that of bringing their client to a speedy trial. The bond of \$40,000, upon which Mr. Rixey has been released, his liberty since the indictment against him was found, was renewed and his trial set for September 18th. An effectual attempt was made to quash certain indictments upon the ground that the grand jury, which returned them, was not lawfully constituted.

NOTED SINGER IN TROUBLE REQUIRES INSPECTION WANTED

Frank W. Cunningham to Face State Veterinarian's Apprehensions. Charge in Richmond. Arrest Regulations of Interstate Shipments of Live Stock. Court N at Tuesday.

Mr. Frank W. Cunningham, who in former years was regarded as one of the best tenor singers in the state of Virginia and who, upon one occasion, delighted a Manassas audience with his rich and powerful tenor voice, and who has officiated, for some length of time, as collector of taxes for the City of Richmond, was suspended from office Wednesday, pending an investigation of alleged misconduct and neglect of duty.

Collector Cunningham is charged with the misapplication of taxes collected for the City of Richmond for the year 1910, from the following firms and corporations: W. H. Harris Grocery Company, \$380; Richmond Press, \$140; Southern Bargain House, \$462; Vaughan-Robertson Drug Company, \$278; Turner Paint and Oil Company, \$7; Kirk Parish Company, \$36; and from Kirkwood Mitchell, \$233.65.

Tuesday, April 25th, is set for the investigation of the charges against the alleged delinquent collector who is now confined to his bed, under the care of a physician. The order suspending Mr. Cunningham follows: To Frank W. Cunningham, Esq., Collector of the City Taxes of the City of Richmond. Take notice that on the written report of the special accountant and the evidence produced before me, and under authority of Section 120 of the constitution of Virginia and the acts of the general assembly in pursuance thereof, I, D. C. Richardson, mayor of the City of Richmond, Virginia, do hereby suspend you, the said Frank W. Cunningham, collector of the city taxes of the City of Richmond, from the discharge of your official duties as such collector for misconduct and neglect of duty, and suspend you to take effect on the service of this notice, and continue until the said occasion shall be heard and determined.

Destructive Wind and Hail Storm. Nine persons are dead and nearly one hundred were injured by the destructive wind and hail storm which swept over western Missouri last week.

In St. Louis, three are dead, and property valued at between \$1,500,000 and \$2,500,000 was destroyed.

There was a remarkable precipitation of hail stones. Some of these are reported as being three inches in diameter. Hail caused the greatest damage. Thousands of windows were broken. Green houses were demolished.

At Yaltes Mines, Mo., the tornado killed four persons and seriously injured a score or more.

At Cadet, Mo., two women are known to have been killed and fifteen persons are reported injured.

At Shelbyville, Ill., hail stones eight inches in circumference were reported.

At Anna, Ill., growing crops were badly damaged by the hail and wind.

The tornado, which brought destruction in Caplet and Yaltes Mines, swept over and did considerable damage to several points in Washington and Montgomery. St. Francis and Jefferson are the lead belt counties, and among the towns suffering heavily were Flat River, Esther and Elvins. In the three towns named fifty persons were more or less seriously injured.
