MARTIN AND SWANSON WIN REXEY ADJUDGED INSANE LEWIS R. HOOFF ARRESTED SILVERWARE NOT WANTED

Records of Incumbent Senators Meet Hearty Approval at the Polls.

Senators Martin and Swanson were nominated for the United States Senate over Jones and Glass, in last week's primary, by majorities which approximate nearly 35,000 out of an estimated vote of 75,000.

Committed to Western State Hospital--Proceedings Irregular Says Mr. Brent.

Mr. C. Jones Rixey, former president of the Virginia Safe Deposit and Trust Corporation, was adjudged insane in Orange last Saturday, by a commission consisting of Drs. W. C. Blaisdell, of the United States Navy, W. J. Crittenden, of Unionville, J. M. Scott, of Raccoon Ford, and F. B. Perry, of Orange, and sent to the Western State Hospital on the evening train.

Warrant Charges Misconduct of Affairs of Mercantile Building and Loan Association.

While the grand jury of the corporation court of Alexandria, under instructions of Judge Barlow, was inquiring into the affairs of the Mercantile Building and Loan Association as to any criminal mismanagement of the association, a warrant was in the hands of an officer, charging Lewis R. Hooff, of Alexandria, former secretary and manager of the institution, with obtaining a certificate of stock valued at \$2,800 from the defunct corporation and with obtaining \$1,500 from the Virginia Safe Deposit and Trust Corporation.

Was the Conclusion of Burglars Who Entered Dr. Bernhard's Residence Last Week.

Last Friday night while Dr. and Mrs. J. Walter Bernhard were absent from their home in East Centre street, on a visit to friends in Pennsylvania, the premises were burglarized and three safety razors, shaving mug, razor strap and a tin box, containing some valuable papers, were carried off. The tin box was found, Saturday afternoon, on the railroad culvert opposite the residence of Mr. John W. Prescott, by William Robinson, Jr., and turned over to Sergeant Willcox. The lid of the box had been pried open far enough to ascertain that the box contained nothing of value to the thief or thieves and nothing was missing therefrom so far as Dr. Bernhard can recall.

Samuel G. Brent, of Alexandria, received a telegram signed by John S. Barbour, one of Mr. Rixey's attorneys, immediately following the action of the commission, notifying him that duplicate papers and evidence in the proceedings would be forwarded to him by mail, and that the writer would see him personally on the following Monday.

For some time past Mr. Rixey has been staying with his son-in-law, Mr. R. W. Stearns, in Orange.

When Mr. Brent was asked for a statement regarding the case, he said it was rather singular that such proceedings should be taken at this time. The statute of the state, he declared, provides that when a man is insane and cannot be brought before the court, the court has the power to send him to the insane asylum for criminals at Marion, Va.

It seems to be the opinion of many that Mr. Rixey will never be tried on the eight indictments pending against him in connection with the failure of the corporation of which he was the chief officer, as the probability is that the court will grant an indefinite continuance of his case pending further medical testimony on his condition.

Mr. Hooff was arrested at noon, Monday, in Alexandria, as he was about to board a train for Washington. The warrant was sworn out by Commonwealth's Attorney, Samuel G. Brent. Bond was fixed at \$10,000 which was promptly furnished pending further investigation of the charges.

The grand jury, Wednesday afternoon, with John W. May as foreman, returned nine indictments against Hooff, accusing him with the larceny of \$1,500 of the Mercantile Building and Loan stock of the value of \$5,100 and of \$3,500 in currency from the Virginia Safe Deposit and Trust Corporation. The grand jury further charged that the eighteenth annual statement of the Mercantile Building and Loan Corporation to the stockholders, dated December 31, 1910, which was examined and approved by Jos. L. Durkin, Attorney, and by the trustees, was misleading and deceptive as to evidence showed that the association was insolvent at the time the said report was made.

DR. C. M. BAGGARLY DEAD

Noted Specialist Dies of Typhoid Fever in Virginia Hospital, Richmond, Last Week.

Dr. Carroll M. Baggarly, prominent eye, ear and throat specialist, associated with Dr. Joseph A. White, at 200 East Franklin street, Richmond, died in Virginia hospital in that city of typhoid fever, last week, following an illness of several weeks.

Interment was made in the Methodist churchyard at Flat Hill, Rappahannock county, under the auspices of Washington lodge No. 78, A. F. and A. M., of which the deceased was a member.

In addition to looking after the duties in his special line of work, Dr. Baggarly spent a portion of his time in biological laboratory work in Richmond College. He was also associate professor of ophthalmology in the University College of Medicine and was a former teacher in the Woman's College in Richmond.

Dr. Baggarly was a near relative of the late Mrs. W. B. Kincheloe, of Manassas, and is well known here.

ASHLAND'S INDIGNATION

Town Council Passes Segregation Ordinance to Keep Out Negro School.

The inhabitants of Ashland are up in arms against an attempt of a descendant of the Laurens family to dispose of the beautiful Laurens homestead on College avenue, in Ashland, to a representative of the Tuskegee Institute, of which Booker T. Washington is president, in order that a preparatory branch of that famous university might be established in the town.

"We will not permit a negro school to stand opposite old Randolph-Macon. We will never allow a negro boarding school to be established in this town anywhere at all," declared the residents of Ashland, with one accord, heatedly.

The city council met Monday night and took such steps as will likely make the establishment of the proposed school an impossibility in the face of determined opposition by the passage of a segregation ordinance.

It is reported that the proposed sale of the Laurens homestead is in the hands of certain Richmond attorneys. These attorneys, at last accounts, had not verified the report. Meanwhile Ashland, not knowing whether or not the report is true, continues to cry aloud its emphatic protest.

H. CLAY BEATTIE, JR., CONVICTED.

Henry Clay Beattie, jr., has been convicted of the murder of his wife at a lonely spot on the Middlethian turnpike in Chesterfield county on the night of July 18 and sentenced to be electrocuted between the hours of sunrise and sunset on November 24.

The outcome brings no surprise to those familiar with the swift course of Virginia justice, especially where the sanctity of the home has been invaded; virtue assailed or brutality in the extreme committed.

That the perpetrator of one of the most shocking crimes ever committed and which will go down in history as the most sickening and revolting murder committed in Virginia, was convicted by public sentiment before he was indicted, there is but little doubt.

Even had he, by legal technicalities, escaped the law he could never escape the abhorrence and contempt of his fellow beings. His denial of the murder of his child-wife with an infant at her bosom, but freely admitting other contemptible crimes against the sanctity of his home made an unfavorable impression upon the twelve men who listened and shuddered at his awful story.

His indifferent and flippant manner while reciting the horrible tragedy in the presence of his bloodstained garments and the instrument which played such an important part in snuffing out the life of a woman he had sworn to love and protect revealed himself to the world as a creature without a soul; a living being utterly devoid of the qualities of mind and heart and a leper to society.

The enrollment of the Manassas graded schools for the present session shows a large increase over that of the last session. The enrollment in the Bennett Building is 240 and that in the Ruffner Building about 70. Prof. B. F. Ham has ordered through Messrs. G. W. Bell and brothers, one hundred pounds of platinum ore from the Bell Brothers, to be shipped to the James' Ore Concentrating Company at Newmarket, to be used in the test of their concentrating machinery before such machinery is shipped to the Sinclairs Mill mines for installation.

When Station Agent Clark unsealed a car load of brewery grain last Friday, loaded at Alexandria and consigned to Mr. Thomason at this place, a setter pip was at the door anxious to make her escape from a prison in which she had been kept without food or water, for no telling how long. 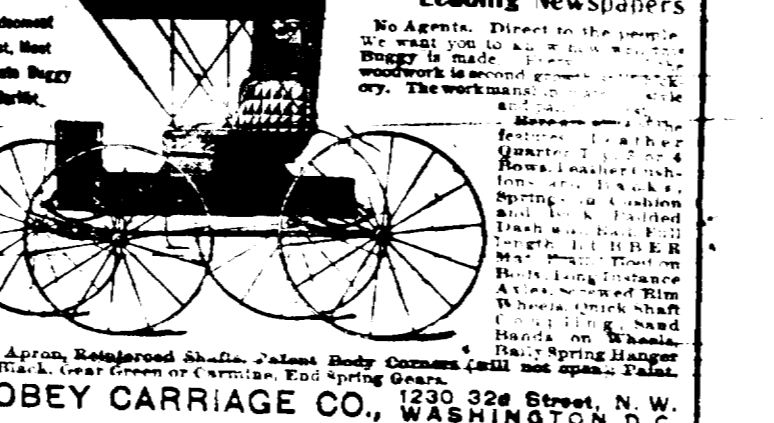

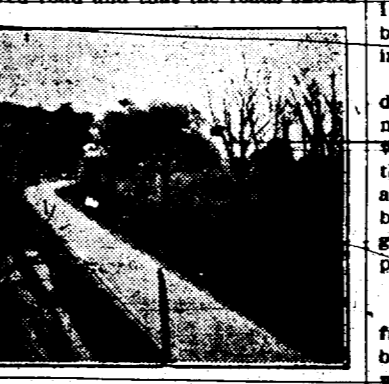

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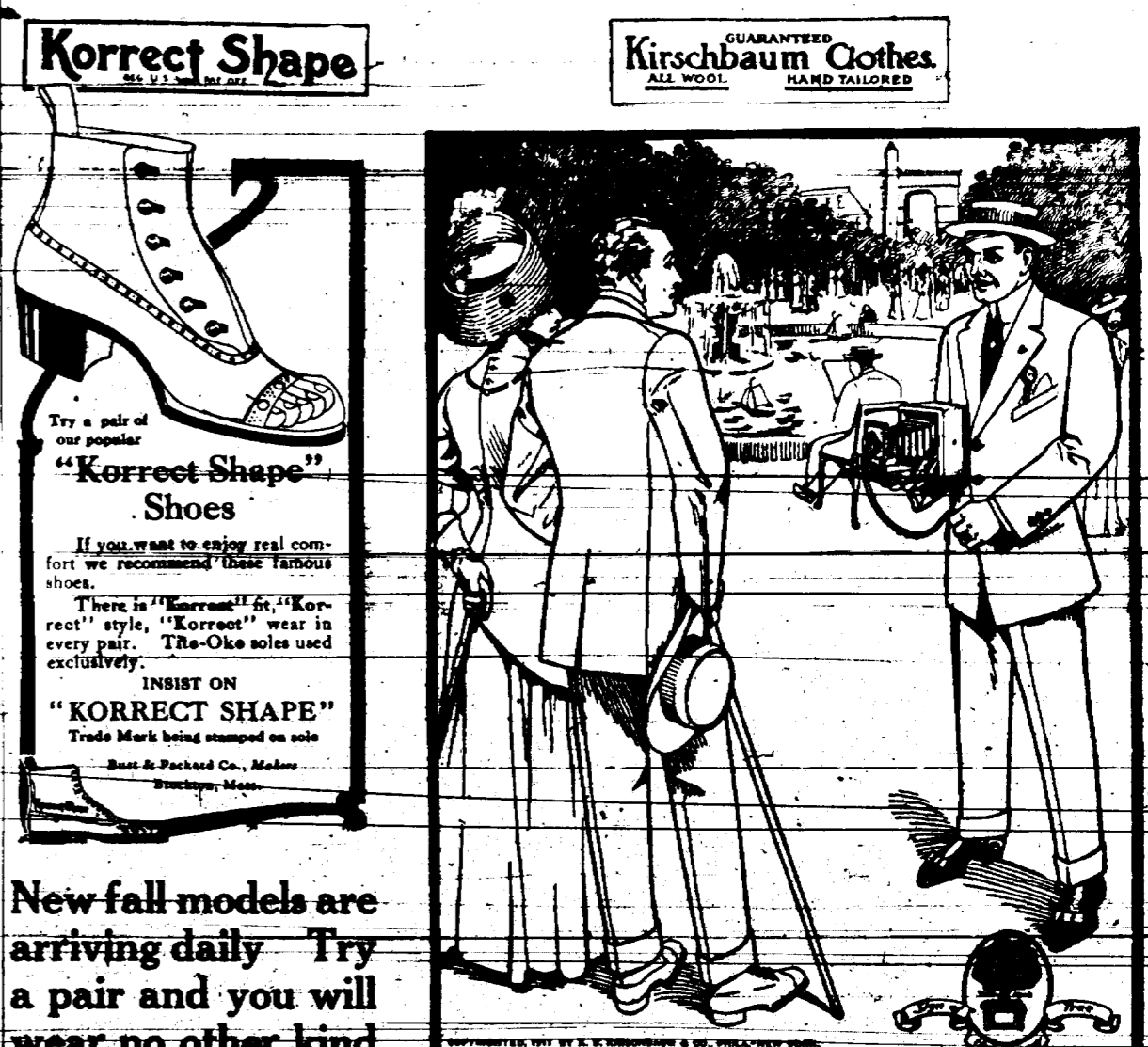
