URGES BIRD PROTECTION

Citizen Makes Intelligent Plea For Life of the Little Insect Destroyers.

EDITOR JOURNAL:—After the farmer and gardener has gone to the trouble and expense of plowing, preparing and fertilizing his fields and truck patches and made ready for planting, he has left much to flock or chance, when no thought has been given to the control of insects that attack the growing crops, and only too often causes loss and failure.

Insect pests are increasing every year, and since it is conceded that this increase is largely due to the destruction of birds and toads, the question becomes one of great importance. It is also true that many new insects have been lately imported.

The toad is one of the farmer's and gardener's best friends as he feeds wholly on insects. These harmless creatures are getting scarcer every year on account of the mowing machine and disc harrow and other new machinery, that the farmer can not do without; so we must protect what we can, and the one that comes nearest taking the toad's place is Bob White. He feeds on the same insects.

Another great pest is threatening us and that is the ant. They really do more damage to the farmer's early corn than any other one insect. They are exceedingly destructive in gardens and melon beds. Besides the direct damage they do—they protect the aphid-plant lice that suck the juices of the growing melon vines and other tender vegetables.

We must look to Bob White and the flicker or golden-winged woodpecker to destroy them. There are other birds that eat ants and their eggs, especially the pheasant or ruffed grouse, now almost extinct through the sportman, but the two I have named devour more ants than any other birds we now have.

Some farmers seem to think that Bob White lives mostly on grain. That is a big mistake as he eats ten weed seeds to one seed of any grain, and they live mostly through the summer on insects.

What does the farmer get for the partridge and robin killed on his farm? He does not get one out of a hundred and if he got all it would not pay. Besides, when a robin is killed he is at that moment searching the ground for one of our most destructive pests, the cutworm, for they come to the top of the ground the first of all insects or worms.

If the farmer wants to keep the insects down he must protect the birds.
