WOMEN TO HELP FARMERS Splendid Address. Leads to Formation of Auxiliary Branch of Agricultural Institute. Continued From Second Page. tutes have been in vogue for some years, they have rivalled the institutes for men, and have exerted a wonderful influence in the improvement of the home life on Ontario farms. Last year there were held in Ontario 5,500 meetings of women's institutes with a total attendance of 140,888. Think of the women in the United States organizing to that extent and the wonderful influence for good it would have on our rural life. These institutes have nothing whatever to do with the business of farming, but embrace only women's spheres of activity. They appreciate the opportunity afforded to exchange recipes, experiences, observations and plans of work, and the social advantages and opportunities of becoming better acquainted with neighbors; and besides gaining valuable knowledge, they form a deeper interest in those things which make for a higher and more wholesome community life. When women will drive thirty to thirty-five miles to attend these meetings in order to get something to assist them in making their local societies a success, we can but conclude there is an earnest interest in the work which must result in universal benefit. The husband notices that the mother performs her work in a more systematic manner, with less labor, while the family is better nourished with plain, wholesome food placed before them.

them in an attractive and varied form. He observes that a few well chosen plants are artistically grouped in the house during the winter months, while the garden contains a judicious selection of vegetables and small fruits, and a sprinkling of flowers. Much attention is paid to the selection and care of the fowls, with the result that the part of the farming operation has yielded an increased income and has become the source of a constant supply of fresh eggs and poultry for the farm table. With less manual labor and a higher standard of thought and planning, the family is accomplishing more and more in dollars and cents on the farm—have more time for recreation and social intercourse, and enjoy better health as a result of better selected and properly prepared food, and appreciate the advantage of rural life under modern conditions. The boy notices that mother has more time to read that formerly, and that she has a definite purpose in her reading and study. Such of what she reads applies to the topics which are to be taken up or have already been considered by the local institute. She talks to the boys and girls and to the father about the topics which she is to discuss at the next monthly meeting, and it may be that the other members of the family will have suggestions to offer. The growing interest of each in the work is manifest, and soon the boy begins to ask questions respecting his opportunity and is told to take a short course at the agricultural college or to attend the agricultural high school. The daughter notices that mother has a greater interest in every day routine which has lost some of its monotony in the variety and the simplicity of methods introduced through the institute.

valued another important phase of country life that is of first importance in many of our states. I refer to the question of farm labor or hired help either in the field or in the house. I firmly believe that this factor will relieve itself in the other conditions here mentioned. No inferior quality is not such an important factor with rural life in the southern states where the negro is common as it is in the northern states, and even in Missouri the negro problem the farmer now has to contend with is the scarcity of hired help in both field and kitchen, and it alone has been the principal cause of the recent exodus there from the rural districts. But the reason of this scarcity is not because of inadequate money compensation, because wages are now 46 per cent. higher than they were ten years ago. The reason is because that help do not have the conveniences on the farm that village and city help enjoy, and as soon as this whole matter is corrected the labor problem will solve itself. Statistics recently gathered from representative farming people in Missouri show that in this respect the average of farming state, less than 2 per cent. of the farm homes have running water, less than 3 per cent. have furnace or other modern heating systems, and less than 4 per cent. have any form of gas or electric lighting systems. Institutions do much to dispel that narrow view which is the natural result of living too much to oneself, and petty jealousies and factions will soon disappear in an institute organization, where furthering of common objects makes us either forget them or else broods over our minds until we are influenced by them, while we look to the good and not to the bad in others, but stand for industry, thrift, conservation of energies, intellectual and moral advancement, healthful recreation, social intercourse, high standards of living, public spirited citizens and a life that is good and true. Thus far I have been discussing in a general way the broad field of woman's activity in the improvement of country life. Let us now take up a more definite thought. Although a large amount of domestic science instruction is being given to rural girls in educational institutions, comparatively little has been done in this direction in the rural schools and almost nothing in the way of conveying this information to the housewife on the farm. While it may be argued that rural women are, as a class, superior to village and city women in the matter of preparing and cooking food, it is still room for great improvement, and a surprising lack of knowledge respecting the principles on which their various operations are based is common to both classes. A knowledge of these principles and of nutritive values and balanced rations will be good economy and lead to better health. But this subject is not all the housewife is seeking for. She desires modern information respecting all her activities as the real head of the local, social and cooperative society called the home, as well as respecting her relation to the community. We have no other comprehensive system by which all this information can be successfully gained, these women that reach rural communities throughout each county in every state, apart or organized farmers' institutes for men with women auxiliaries for their women. In this way, the women will be brought together for mutual, common good. It may take several years to complete a proper system for the instruction of rural women in the great improvement of country life, but what has been accomplished in this direction by some of the more progressive foreign nations like Austria, Belgium, Sweden, Norway, Denmark, Switzerland, France and Germany, encourages us to similar efforts. Women's institutes of local clubs can usually obtain the services of specialists who can give instruction that will be of lasting value to the entire community, while not always taking the place of local talent, should be encouraged whenever possible. In order to encourage the formation of women's institutes throughout the land, the following general instructions, plans of organization, and sample constitution may be of service.
