

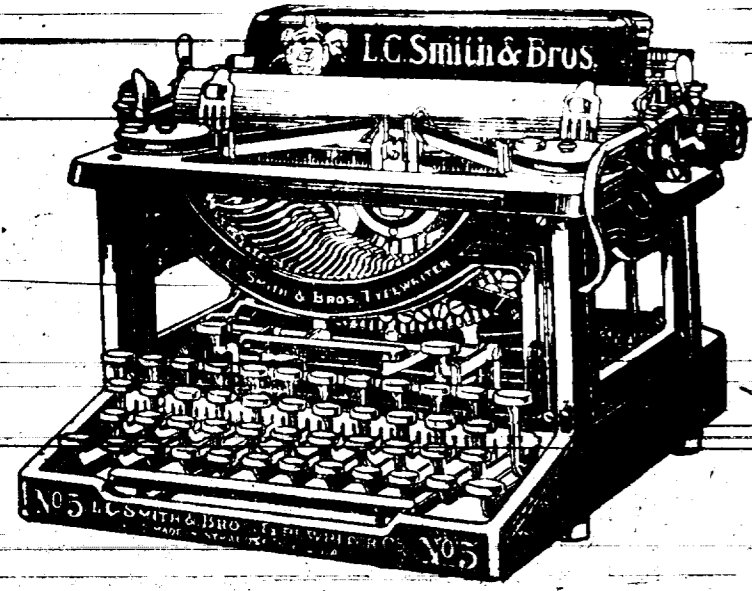

PROFITABLE SESSION ENDS MR. CARLIN ON THE JOB WARRENTON MAN KILLED

The second four-day traveling school of Agriculture conducted here by the Virginia Experiment Station of Blacksburg, is a matter of pleasant memory. As compared with last year's meeting it was better in every way. The attendance, as shown by the registration, was about 400, and the interest of the patrons, as evidenced by their questions and discussions, showed a widespread interest in all phases of modern agriculture.

The commencement of the fight which is to be pushed at this session of Congress for the Mount Vernon Avenue, which is to extend from the Capital to Washington's home on the Potomac, was made in Congress last week when Representative Charles C. Carlin, of Alexandria, re-introduced his bill for the return to the state of Virginia of \$128,000. This action was preliminary to his resolution for the building of the avenue.

There is every reason for the belief that the bill will pass Congress this year. Senator Martin is confident that it will go through the Senate, as it has on two previous occasions, and Mr. Carlin is equally confident that the Democratic House will pay the sum due the Old Dominion.

Representative Carlin has also introduced a bill transferring jurisdiction over the site acquired for a reform school for the District of Columbia, in Fairfax County, Virginia, from the commission to the Secretary of War. The site in question is known as "Belvoir" of the "White House Tract." It contains 1,500 acres. Mr. Carlin proposes that the \$38,000 made available for the purchase of the site for a reform school be allowed the District for the purchase of a site for that purpose elsewhere, and that the Secretary of War utilize the site for a school of equitation (horsemanship).

Mr. Carlin of Virginia also introduced a bill appropriating \$12,000 for the modernizing of the roadway upon the United States government ground occupied by the Arlington National Cemetery and the experimental farms in Alexandria County, Va.

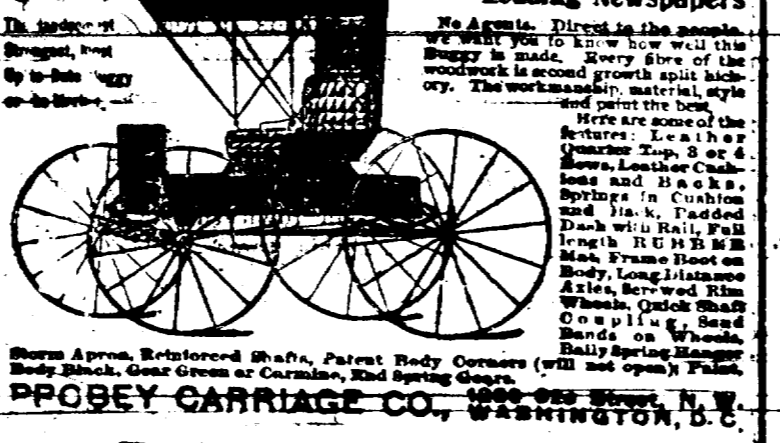

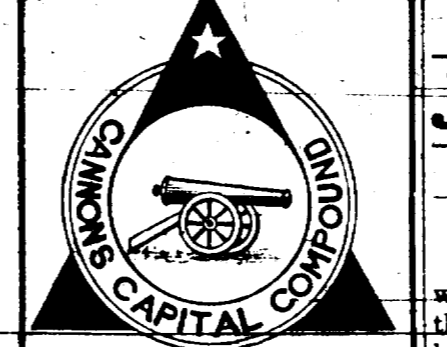
