FARMERS HOLD BIG SESSION

Officers for Year Elected—Plans Made Addresses—Plans Made For County Fair.

not contain sufficient phosphoric acid to balance the nitrogen. Fine ground raw phosphate rock contains from 25 to 35 per cent. of phosphoric acid in an insoluble form. If applied in the stable manure, this is made available though not so quickly as when the acid phosphate is used. Lime is a necessity and the speaker warmly advocated the Illinois plan of grinding lime by convict labor and selling it to the farmers at cost. Two and a half tons of ground raw limestone and 300 pounds of raw phosphate rock to the acre has doubled the yield of many soils in Southern Illinois. The soils of this section are according to their color and fertility of three groups. The Penn series of red soils derived from the shales and sandstones and named from the place in Pennsylvania where the soil survey first encountered them. These are among the strongest soils in the United States. The white soils with red clay subsoil are of the Cecil series and if well handled are as good as the first. The white soils with a white subsoil are of the Chester series and are of less natural fertility than the others. In the management of the red soils the heavy types the greatest need is thorough deep tillage to allow the rain to enter freely. Big horses, big plows and disc harrows are more important than anything else in tilling this type of soil. Stable manure and phosphates are more productive of results than any other fertilizer. On the white soils with red subsoil, lime and phosphates are necessary and when they are applied large crops of legumes and wheat may be secured. The

blackjack soil should be improved by coarse manures and when good enough it will raise the best York Imperial and Stayman's Winesap apples of any of our local soil types. Dr. Knapp spoke on some of the broader aspects of country life. The South has waked up agriculturally and while Iowa and Kansas have not increased their yields per acre in 20 years, every one of the Southern states greatly increased not only the acreage of corn but the yield per acre, in some instances as much as 40 per cent. Along with this has gone an improvement in all of the ways of living, roads, schools, churches and homes. The "back to the farm movement" is not half so important as the "stay on the farm movement." We must have a different kind of school," declared Dr. Knapp, "one which will educate for country life." The people of the South are in an attitude of seeking for new knowledge and the schools must help to make this knowledge more general. Every man who owns an acre of land owns a part of the state of Virginia and is a part of the state to a far greater degree than the man who does not own land. The time is coming and it is not far off when land will be so valuable that a young man will not be able to purchase it. We have a right to use the land, but not to abuse it. The time will soon come when the man who wastes his land will be accounted as an enemy of society because he has destroyed the means of subsistence of future generations. The committee on the agricultural fair reported as given in last week's JOURNAL. As the organization of the Farmers' Institute is not suitable for conducting a fair, a committee consisting of Messrs. Hutchison, Button, Tyler, Conner and Steele were appointed to organize a fair and draw up a constitution for an agricultural fair. President Hutchison asked Mrs. F. M. Shaw, Mrs. May Dogan, Mrs. Chas. Lewis and Mrs. Hutchison to prepare a plan for the ladies share in the fair and present it at the March meeting. The meeting adjourned to meet again March 16th.

SENATOR MARTIN FOR PRESIDENT.

The boom for Senator Thomas S. Martin for president, which was started at a banquet in Alexandria a few weeks ago, is rapidly growing and has begun to attract national speculation and interest. Clubs are being formed in different sections and an organized effort will unquestionably be made to have Virginia's delegation instructed to support him in the Baltimore convention. The Washington Evening Star has some good things to say in this connection, and at the same time gives some good Virginia political history. In part its editorial reference is as follows: "Ole Virginny never tire." Well, why should she tire? Mr. Martin is a good man. He has had a longer and more conspicuous political career than any other Virginian. Governor Marshall of Indiana, Gov. Dix of New York, Gov. Foss of Massachusetts, or Mayor Gavnor, all of whom are under discussion in connection with the Baltimore nomination. He is in his 57th year as senator, and has just been chosen for a fourth. He leads the Senate minority, and while without brass-band methods, does so well. It is good to see the Old Dominion taking notice again. She has played a great part in our presidential history. Washington, Jefferson, Madison and Monroe rendered great service to the country in the White House. In those days the Virginia statesmen stood well forward in the picture. Wood was Virginia's first president, and his Virginia by birth, but was chosen President from Ohio, and Zachary Taylor was a son of Virginia, though chosen from Louisiana, or rather from the army. John Tyler's failure in office injured the state. She did not "come back." For a long time she did not count at all in presidential calculations. It was said that the soil was exhausted, though that was but an exaggeration of politics. Many of her sons made good figures in the world, but none attained the supreme place. In the affairs of the Southern Confederacy she was conspicuous in military rather than civil life. President Davis was from Mississippi. Vice President Stephens was from Georgia, while the leading member of the cabinet was Mr. Benjamin of Louisiana. But some of the best commanders were her sons, and Gen. Lee was not only the greatest soldier of the cause, but took rank with the greatest soldiers of the era. After the war matters drifted until John W. Daniel got his chance and impressed himself on his party. His name was suggested for President several times though he cherished no ambition in that direction and encouraged none of the compliments of his friends. He was always "regular" and much respected, and while he supported Mr. Bryan with enthusiasm at the beginning of the latter's national career, he advocated a new leadership. Mr. Daniel was an orator. Mr. Martin is not. But neither was Washington, Jefferson, Madison, Monroe, Harrison, Tyler or Taylor. Jefferson's extraordinary power was with his pen, his genius as a master contributor to political oratory was Patrick Henry, never a presidential possibility.

Dr. Brower, of Catharpin, Gives Remedies Successfully Used For New Horse Diseases. Continued From First Page Rhubarb two drams, Aconite ten drops, and Echinacea one-half ounce. The purgatives acted so freely that on the third day I found it necessary to check the bowel action to some extent, and for this purpose gave her two doses of Laudanum of about one-half ounce each with an ounce of Tincture of Catechu, giving the Catechu and Echinacea at intervals of about three or four hours. I neglected to say that the first thing we gave her was three ounces of whiskey in one-half pint of warm milk. After the third day we confined our efforts to trying to keep up her vitality by drenching her with a half dozen raw eggs and one and a half pints of new milk two or three times a day, until she would eat a little bran, oats and salt.

MEETZE HITS HARD.

In referring to the splendid speech by Delegate Meetze, of this county, on the Jordan prohibition enabling bill, in the House Tuesday afternoon, the News Leader says: A neat little passage at arms occurred on the floor of the house of delegates during the discussion of the enabling act late yesterday afternoon. Delegate Meetze, Prince William, was speaking and was making good on a promise to "make as much noise as anybody else." Also he was pouring hot shot into the opponents of the enabling act. He was not speaking generalities either. He was mentioning names—and he was paying particular attention to Delegate Hugh White. In the midst of the discourse, White arose from his seat and sauntered toward the exit. Meetze spotted him and waved him back. "Come back and take your medicine like a man," he shouted, while the galleries roared with laughter. "Won't the gentleman even allow me to go out and take a smoke?" asked White piteously. "No," shouted Meetze. "It's had enough for you to be supporting whiskey without smoking cigarettes, too." "I thought the gentleman from Prince William would be glad enough to smoke me out," declared White. "I'll doze it," Meetze came back, "and let me tell you this, smoking isn't anything compared to what you 'set' fellows are going to get when you die."

If the great amount of money that is unnecessarily spent and much for what is worse than useless, would be applied to useful purposes in building up and improving our country we could literally make it a paradise. I believe that when God created man and placed him on this planet with everything under his control, he expected more from man than he is getting.

If much of the money that has been and is still being spent by our government for war purposes, such as building great monster war ships and paying pensions to persons who never had the merit of burned powder to their nostrils, would be used in building up the country with good roads and other like improvements, it would give employment to millions of persons at good wages.
