those trees standing near diseased cedar trees. During the past summer the Virginia Agricultural Experiment Station at Blacksburg, has conducted field and laboratory experiments on this disease in Frederick county. These experiments, as well as those conducted the previous year in Rockingham county, show that the lime-sulphur and Bordeaux sprays that are ordinarily employed in apple spraying, will not control this disease. The time of applying the spray is very important. For spraying to be at all effective, the young leaves must be covered with spray as soon as they unfold and kept covered while the cedar apples are blooming, that is till about the middle of June. The most effective and the cheapest method of eradicating the Cedar Rust is to destroy the first cause, that is, the cedar trees. Cedar trees will not be a serious menace when none stand closer than one-half mile of the orchard. During these winter days, when our farm work is not pushing, is the time to cut down cedars that are near the orchard. Because the Rust did not cause serious loss in Virginia last summer, many fruit growers may be inclined to abate the war on cedars. The slight rust infection, however, was due to the unusually dry spring and early summer. There is a big crop of cedar apples this year, and all they need is proper weather conditions next spring, to cause plenty of "little Yorks" next fall. Further information about this disease may be secured of the Virginia Experiment Station, Blacksburg, Va.

A BIG CHARTER GRANTED
Maryland-Virginia Railway to Take Over Bluemont Branch of the Southern.
In order to take over and electrify the Bluemont Branch of the Southern Railway, the Maryland-Virginia Railway on Wednesday, obtained from the State Corporation Commission an amendment to its charter, allowing an increase of its capital stock from \$1,000,000 to \$30,000,000. The Bluemont Branch, now operated at a loss by the Southern, will be run in conjunction with the electric lines of the Maryland-Virginia company in the suburbs of Washington. The Bluemont Branch is the transportation artery for the rich section of Virginia between Bluemont, Leesburg and Alexandria, and has about sixty miles of track. Not only is the commuting travel into Washington over this branch heavy, but the amount of freight hauled is considerable. Washington is the logical shopping and farm market of the Leesburg section. The price paid by the Maryland-Virginia for the Bluemont Branch is not known, but it is understood that the transfer will take effect immediately. The Southern will continue to operate its daily trains during the time taken to electrify the line. The Maryland-Virginia Railway Company is an electric company organized by Northern capitalists, with its headquarters at Alexandria. Its original charter, calling for a capital stock of \$1,000,000, was granted by the Corporation Commission in September of 1911, before the merger of the Bluemont Branch was contemplated. The fee paid the commission for the \$25,000,000 increase in capital stock was \$750, which taken with the original fee of \$750, makes a total of \$1,500 paid into the State treasury in fees by this line.

MORE ABOUT GOOD ROADS
Do the people of Prince William county realize what it will mean to our county to have a National Highway running through our State, through our towns and by our farms. This Highway from Quebec, Canada, to Miami, Florida, is a distance of 2,250 miles and will intersect a highway from the Pacific to the Atlantic coast, making in all a distance of 28,000 miles. This will give tourists in the east a chance to visit the north, south and west, and likewise those located in the north, south and west, to come east. We have farmers in Prince William county that now raise two and three blades of grass where one would hardly grow. Now let us get our shoulders to the wheel and haul three tons, where we can hardly haul one. I think there is no better time to agitate good roads, as any team that can haul one ton three miles from Manassas at the present time would be worth \$1,000. I attended a good roads meeting at Fredericksburg last week. Representatives from every county from Richmond to Washington were there, and they all seemed very enthusiastic over good roads and say they will either bond their counties or raise money by private subscription. We should have a good roads meeting at Manassas and get our people interested, especially in the upper end of this county. The lower end of the county had some very able representatives at Fredericksburg, but owing to the many advantages we have, I think there is no doubt Manassas will be the route, provided we can raise sufficient funds. The route we want this road to run through Prince William county from Fairfax county, begins at Mitchell's Ford at Bull Run bridge, runs to Manassas, a distance of four miles; from Manassas to Kiewitt's corner, near Nokesville, by way of Milford, a distance of eight miles; from Kiewitt's direct route to the Fauquier line, a distance of four miles; thence through Fauquier, a distance of twelve miles to the Stafford line. The Fauquier representatives were also at the Fredericksburg meeting and are ready to meet Prince William county with her part. Now, if any one can select a better portion of Prince William county or one that needs a road worse, I will take my hat off to him and work for his cause. Let us get busy and work for good roads; we will enhance the value of our property; we will haul our loads with two horses instead of four, and can ride in automobiles if we want. I am not advocating good roads for self interest, but for the good of the whole community, as I have no automobile, and as long as old Selum is in good condition, may never have one. E. R. CONNER.

AMEND THE CHARTER.
Senator Thornton has written friends here that the bill to amend the charter of Manassas has reached the Senate calendar and that it will be his pleasure to push its passage. The amendment is a very simple one, merely effecting the town charter in relation to electoral franchise, so as to make it conform to the constitution of the State, with which, it seems, we are out of harmony. The issue was brought to the attention of the Town Council, through its attorneys, when the proposition arose to bond the municipality for water, lights and sewerage. Under section 18 of the charter, only freeholders would have been permitted to vote upon a bond issue, no matter whether the issue was for one or one thousand years. The injustice of the section now being amended is apparent. The question of bonding the town for public utilities, as it will eventually be submitted to our people, will contain the provision that the debt shall be discharged at the expiration of forty years. It is a sad, but self-evident fact that within, say twenty years, not more than 30 per cent. of the present freeholders will be contributing to the interest, the remaining 70 per cent. having paid their last debt. Very few, if any, will be left in forty years. This naturally comes in the ceaseless, relentless flowing tide of Time. Those who are not freeholders today may be tomorrow, for "We are the same that our fathers have been"—Eso much so, many times, for the growth and prosperity of the nation.

It would, therefore, be infinitely unfair not to allow the alert and intelligent young generation, our successors who would ultimately be required to assume and discharge the public debt, to vote upon the proposition. We bequeath obligations and all to our posterity, and it is well that those who have reached their majority and who are on the qualified list of voters, should have a voice in setting a question that will affect them and their children. Let the charter be amended so as to give all a fair and equal chance for expression.

SENATOR MARTIN has offered a bill to pay a pension of \$50.00 per month to Mrs. Eda Bernard Lee, widow of Gen. Fitzhugh Lee. The Senator also desires an appropriation of \$20,000 for the support and education of 120 Indian pupils at the school at Hampton. He has proposed an amendment to the Indian appropriation bill asking for this amount.
