Culpeper Capitalists Coming to Consider Purchase of Franchises. Water, electricity, and, perhaps, a sewerage system, are again looming up and presenting themselves to the vision of the citizens of Manassas.

The New Prince William Hotel, erected by Mr. R. S. Hynson, on the corner of Centre and Main streets, was opened to the reception of guests by the lessee, Mr. R. W. Payne, on Wednesday.

Mrs. Pertie Smith Dies Following an Operation at a Washington City Hospital. Mrs. Pertie Smith, of near Herndon, died following an operation for tumor of the stomach, at a Washington hospital on Thursday last week, aged about 60 years.

The Culpeper Company is making its estimates on the basis set forth in the ordinance passed by the Council at the beginning of the agitation of the question of these public utilities some months ago (published in full in THIS JOURNAL), at which time Mr. Chas. A. Farnum, of Philadelphia, appeared as the falling meteor of the proceedings.

Our Culpeper friends bring us ample assurances that they have capital to carry into effect the full agreement as will be presented to the Town Council tomorrow evening; but, as a member of the Council confided to THE JOURNAL, the Company is seeking only the cream, declining the lesser product—the milk.

As we understand the proposition, the Culpeper Light and Ice Company offers to purchase the electric franchise only, which, in reality, is the vital essence of the privileges offered.

Electric lighting plants pay, where water systems, without sewerage, do not bring the 50 per cent. wanted by the corporation controlling the interests.

The Culpeper folks propose to furnish a lighting system only—they will not obligate themselves, according to the terms read to the Council's representatives, to provide a day power system, unless there should be a sufficient demand (within the judgment of the Company to justify the running of the plant) to employ such a system.

Modern water works, the Company estimated, would cost \$25,000, aside from the pumping station and its necessary apparatus. It was suggested in the proposition submitted that the Town provide the system and the electric plant furnish pumps and required fittings and pump the water from the town well to the tower for ten cents per 1,000 gallons, provided the town used not less than 2,500,000 gallons per annum.

Mr. R. S. Hynson, of the Council, asked if the Company would be willing to allow the town to take \$10,000 worth of common stock in the water plant.

This proposition seemed agreeable but from the general discussion to an ordinary layman, water works without a sewerage system, would not be a profitable investment.

It is the opinion of many members of the Council, as well as prominent citizens, and the business communities of the town, that Manassas cannot afford to longer question the necessity of a sewerage. It means more to the health and vigor of her citizenship than any modern stride proposed.

Cesspools, to say the least, are but barbarians' happy estate.
