paratively new buildings of a single story. They were not expensive barns and had no unnecessary frills, adding burdens to the production of clean milk. One man had a barn for a dairy of sixteen cows extended from his old barn as a one-story wing which he said cost him, exclusive of his own labor, \$400. All of the eleven stables were generally lighted and most had the four square feet of glass which gives the perfect score. The few which fell short of that were by no means in bad condition as regards light. All had a satisfactory amount of air space per animal, all but two or three coming up to the 500 feet, which the perfect score calls for, and none were very far from it. In every case there was a silo and many of the dairymen were feeding ensilage at the time of my visit, having an ample supply to last through April. One dairyman was feeding it in a way novel to me. He first filled the cement manger with water from a faucet at the end and then placed the ensilage in that, making a kind of slop.  
Rye was used several inches high (April 18th) and in a number of cases cattle were being turned into that for an hour or two each morning for pasturing. A partial silage system is adopted to a considerable extent in this region; but so far as most of the crops are concerned the cattle are turned into the fields to harvest the forage themselves, saving cutting and hauling to the barn. This saves labor but wastes much of the crop by trampling.  
Garlic (wild onions) is very common in this locality and the great pest of the milkman. A few years ago it was impossible to get milk or butter in the south without the disagreeable garlic odor and flavor, but the progress in dairying has done much to overcome this tendency. Where the land is thoroughly cultivated and green crops grown in succession, the garlic is kept under; and when cattle are not turned into garlicky pastures, conditions can be greatly improved.  
In every case in the above visit, the cows were fairly clean and in no dairy was a mature foetus clinging to their flanks. In each of the eleven dairies the manure was carried to a distance from the barn by a wheelbarrow or carrier. There was no shoveling of manure out of the window or dropping it into a basement cellar.  
Ten of the eleven herds are regularly tuberculin tested and all were in a thrifty condition; no word of hostility to the tuberculin test was heard.  
Each one of the eleven dairies has a milk house, in every one of which there is a milk cooler and also facilities for boiling water for washing the udders.  
None of this kind of work is done in the kitchen as a part of the domestic duties of the family. Seven of the eleven dairymen have power for pumping the water for use in the dairy; this country being level there is no opportunity to use springs in bringing water from gravity to nearby hills. Four of the eleven dairymen use ice to some extent during the summer.  
Taking it all in all, I was both pleased and surprised at the excellent conditions which I found. If there is any other place where a person in a day's drive can inspect eleven dairies, taking them as they come without selecting exceptionally good ones, and find a better bunch, I should be glad to know where that place is.  
These dairies all ship their product to the District of Columbia where, as in other places, extremists and agitators are denouncing the quality of the milk supply. I do not object to reasonable regulations for the

purpose of securing a better milk supply. The best is none too good. Some market milk is unfit for human food and is dangerous. But those sensationalists, who claim that market milk without limitation is "teeming with germs of tuberculosis and typhoid", should be severely criticised.

**BIRTH CLAIMS SETTLED**  
Englishman Unravels Legal Tangles by Help of New Vital Statistics Law.  
Richmond, Va., June 12, 1912. (Special).—Although the new law for recording births and deaths in the State does not become effective until Friday of this week, the statute has already been of service to a number of persons—and, in particular, has unraveled a legal tangle from which an Englishman, a former resident of Virginia, has tried in vain to extricate himself.  
The Englishman in question had a son born in Virginia whom he desired to be educated in England. As the boy was born in a section of the State where births and deaths are not recorded, he could not, of course, take with him a legal record of his age and parentage. Accordingly, when he reached England and made application for admission to the English schools, he was met with the firm declaration that while he might be of proper age and might be a British subject, he could not enter until he had established both facts beyond question.  
This complication was duly reported to the boy's father in Virginia who made a special trip to the town where the boy was born and secured the affidavits of a number of reputable witnesses who attested his birth. In the hope that these would satisfy the English authorities, the father sent them to his son, with instructions to present them to the proper authorities. But again the English law was inexorable: there must be a legal certificate of his birth and until that was forthcoming, the affidavits of a thousand citizens would not be accepted.  
There were special reasons why the father wished the English parentage of his son to be established and he was in despair when he chanced to read that the last General Assembly had passed a law providing for the registration of all births and deaths in Virginia. He read also the statement of the Board of Health that births which could be duly attested, though occurring prior to the passage of the law, would also be recorded.  
He inquired if a certificate secured in this manner would be acceptable to the English authorities and was told that such a document would be received without question. Journeying to Richmond, the father made the proper statement, a duplicate of the birth reported and returned to England rejoicing.  
Health authorities charged with the enforcement of the new law predict that there will be hundreds of applications for copies of certificates and they are doing all in their power to facilitate the record of births and deaths by those who desire this legal protection. Owing to the date at which the law became effective, it has not yet been possible to procure sufficient copies for the administration of the new statute. These, however, are being received daily and will be shipped to local registrars as soon as practicable. Health officers hope to have supplies available for use throughout the State within the next ten days.

**SIR ROBIN GOODFELLOW**  
The Gallant Knight of Birddom Came Early on a Home-Steading Tour.

Sir Robin has now taken upon himself the serious affairs of life. He came early. Like the adventurer for gold in the valley of the Yukon, the matter of cold did not seem to concern him, for he was here by the sixth of February. And this seems to be no exceptional schedule for him, notwithstanding the fact that his human experience, in recent times, has been that February is really our hardest winter month.  
Is this a survival habit of his progenitors, when our seasons differed in their calendar period? The record is not complete.  
We only know that having seen his children reach the age of responsibility in the early autumn days, he takes his Southern tour, long before the biting cold of winter. And we know that he returns at a season of our worst winds and snows. So that the evolutionist is prone to think that some primal instinct, not influenced by present climatic conditions, is the law of his migration.  
Unlike our real spring and summer birds, such as the wren, the cardinal, the kingbird and others, that come about our premises in genial weather, the robin braves real winter. In this section he is the first of the feathered tourists.  
By the law of eminent domain in birdland, he homesteaded my lawn and erected his bugulow in a Lawson's cypress, not thirty feet from my door; but he reckoned not well in laying his foundations. The cold season of April prompted him to build heavily. So a rather massive structure of dried grass, roots and mud was piled upon a limb, where it forked from the main body of the tree. Then came the heavy rain and wind and Sir Robin's home fell from its support before even the joys of the household were known, and like the parent whose home has been wrecked by the elements he turned in sorrow for another place to build.  
While we frequently see these birds about the premises, it is not like having them for real neighbors. No visitor is quite like a good neighbor. For, while the robin is not rated high as a songster—his nuptial serenade being no greater compendium than "tu rit tare it, tu rit, tare it," repeated at short intervals—he is a companionable fellow, provided you do not go too near his domicile. If you do, and thus disturb a gentleman's home, he is likely to serve a preliminary "quit" notice on you.  
But it is the simple ways of nature about him that attract you. He is of the fields and woodlands, and yet disposed to be entirely at home on the lawn and in the garden and orchard. In a printed cage he would be a dull creature, indeed; but here on the grass or among the green leaves he is a jewel richly set. He is in harmony with the wild, free life about him. He is at the burning buds and blossoms. Moreover, in this beautiful setting of nature, he is half disposed to make friends with you as he digs out the cutworms and hunts up the slugs prying on your freshly set flowers and plants. His very demeanor seems to say, "Here I am, a pretty good sort of a fellow. Let's be neighbors. What say you?"  
Surely you will not answer with a murderous shotgun. Surely you will not cruelly blot out a life that carries with it so much of the joy of living. Strange, foolish man, if you do! Poor, thoughtless boy, do you really think a fine fellow Sir Robin real? He may not be much of a songster, but did you ever hear such glad, bursting, free notes? Did you ever know a creature so

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**A GIANT BAS-RELIEF MAP**  
Built Up of Soils and Minerals of Various Regions of the South.  
A bas-relief map of the Southern States, measuring 200 by 80 feet, in a building especially constructed for it, is to be erected at the National Conservation Exposition, to be held in Knoxville, Tenn., in the fall of 1913, according to plans announced today from the exposition's Washington office. The map will be built up of soils and minerals of the various regions represented, and will show the mountain and valley contours; the principal streams, with actual running water, and indicating the extent of navigability present and possible; the overworked lands of the Mississippi, of the State of Florida and elsewhere; the location of cities, including the Atlantic and Gulf ports which will receive renewed commercial life with the completion of the Panama Canal; the South's forest areas, and the railways and main highways. Present and possible future power development—along the upper river courses will also be shown, with miniature transmission lines strung from the sources of power to the places where it is or can be utilized. A second floor balcony will be constructed to afford the visitor a bird's-eye view of the map. Upon this balcony will be displayed floral and other exhibits of soil products not shown on the lower floor.  
Along the sides of the map, behind the glass, will be exhibited the various soils of the Southern States in cross section, the soils from each state being beneath its representation on the model. On the other side of the aisle, opposite to the soils, will be contrasted the products raised under poor and under scientific methods. It is planned that the experiment stations of the several states of the South will have their exhibits in this building.  
The building in which this model is to be shown is to be known as the Agricultural and Land Building, and is to measure 300 by 150 feet. Its interior walls are to be constructed of finished wood from the different states, so that the building itself will be a mammoth of soil products.  
As an annex to the building, there will be erected a large auditorium with a seating capacity of 2000. In this hall will be held lectures on various branches of the conservation work, and such assemblies as that of the National Conservation Congress, good roads conventions, and drainage and waterway conferences.  
The National Conservation Exposition has behind it such men of national prominence in conservation work as Gifford Pinchot, Dr. Harvey W. Wiley, U. S. Commissioner of Education, Philander P. Clanton, and Bradford Knapp, of boys' corn club fame. These and other men and women of like standing constitute the advisory board of the exposition and are directing the conservation features.
