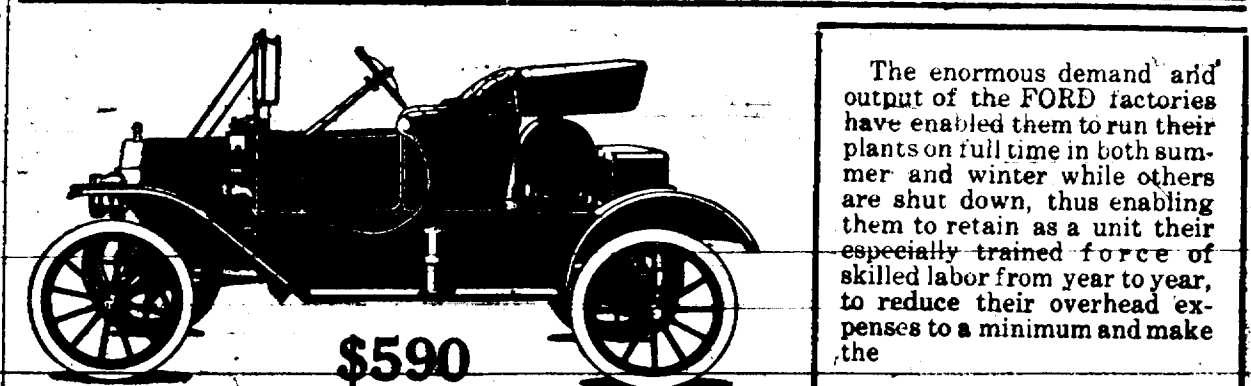

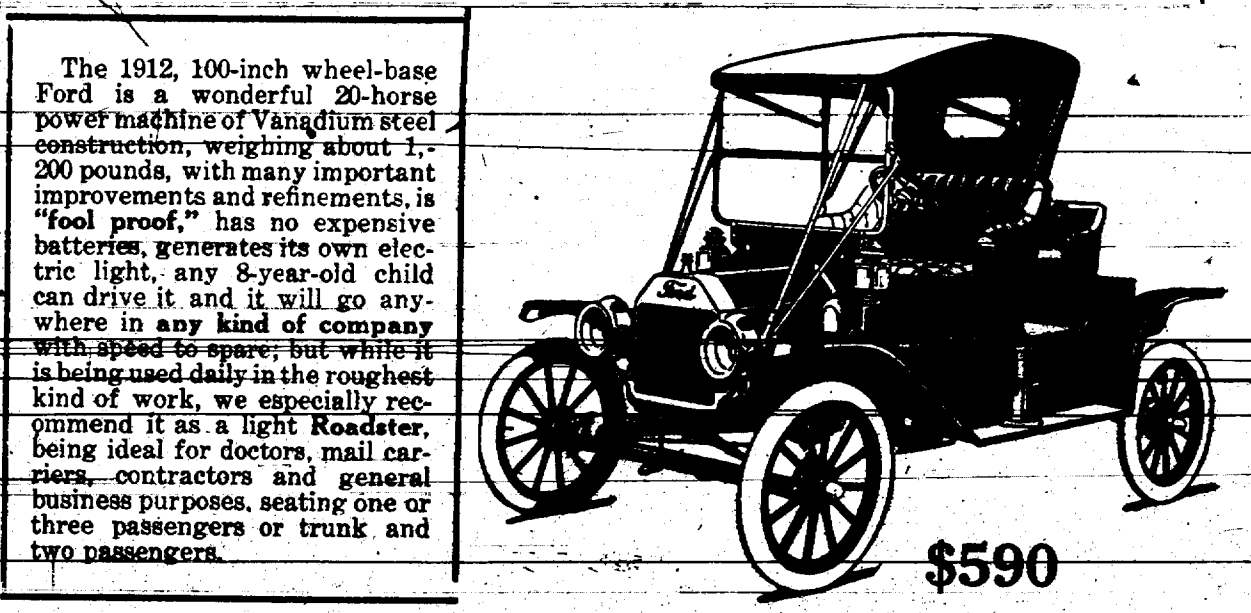

R. F. & P. R. FOR COMPROMISE

Railroad Now Ready to Settle Dispute With State—Will Surrender Charter.

The R. F. & P. R. R. has indicated its desire for a settlement of all the differences between the road and the Commonwealth. It has asked that the special commission organized for the purpose of treating with the railroad concerning a compromise of the arrears of taxes held by the State to be unpaid.

SUNDAY'S WIND STORM

A Heavy Fall of Rain and Strong Wind Makes Path Through The County.

This county was visited again last Sunday afternoon, by a heavy fall of rain and considerable wind in some sections.

Both the electric and steam railroads were struck by lightning while crowded with passengers who gathered there to await trains or to escape the violence of the storm.

Uniontown, Pa., July 24.—Bringing death to probably forty persons and doing a property damage of more than \$1,000,000, a terrible rainstorm and flood swept this section of Pennsylvania today.

Twenty thousand persons, residents of the valley beneath the Cold Springs reservoir, the largest of the Fayette county, are fleeing from their homes, fearing a repetition of the Austin disaster.
