The demand for cholera serum has greatly increased. It is recommended purely as a preventive.

State Inspectors Destroy Fruits And Cereals.

Inspectors for the department are now destroying from 500 to 1,000 packages of such foods every day. They are paying close attention to this feature of their work.

It seems that the worms appear most frequently in packages which have been on the shelves for a year or longer.

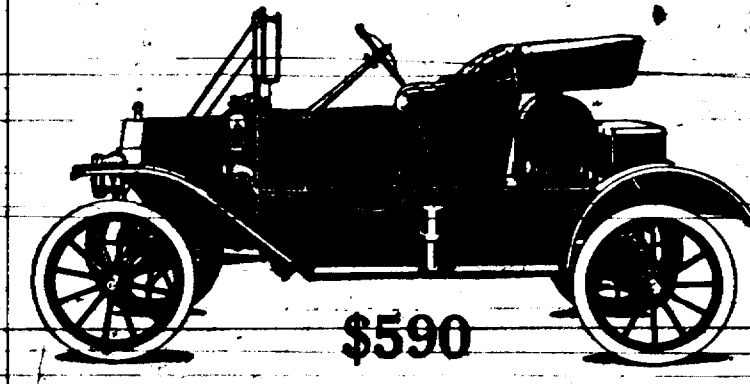

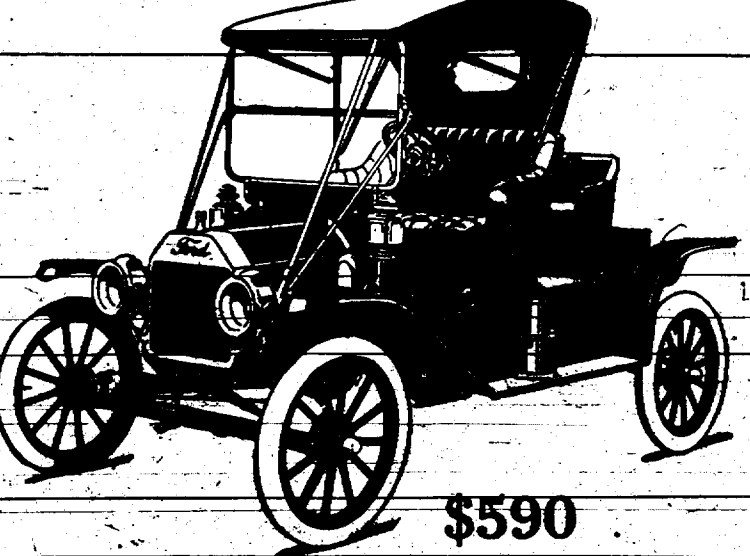
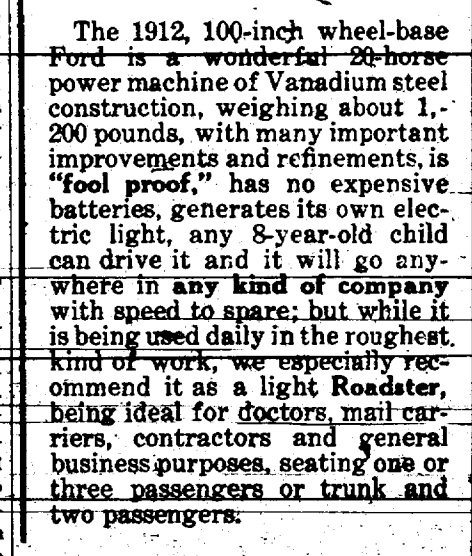
