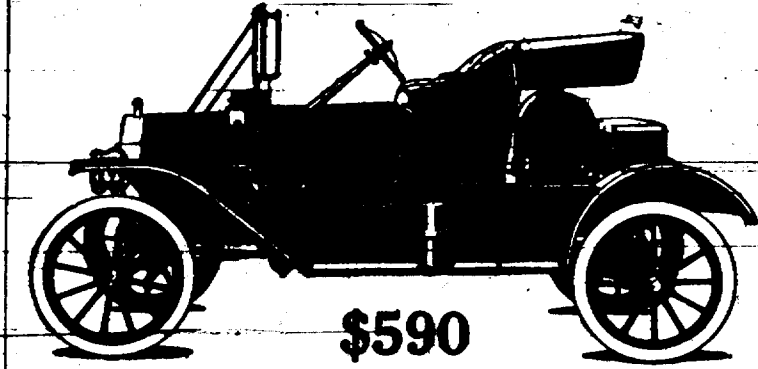

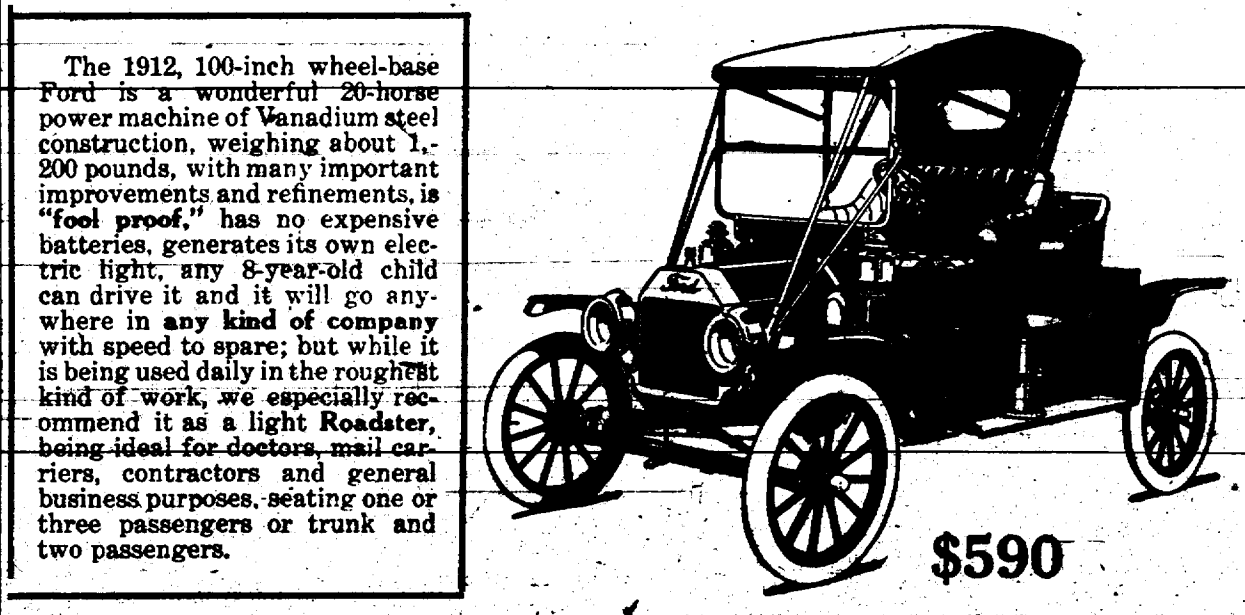

DEATH OF DR. HATCHER PROBE BANK DEPOSITS BURGLARS AGAIN IN TOWN A LADY SERIOUSLY HURT THE ARMY WORM PEST BOUGHT MINERAL SPRING

Was Prominent Minister and Founder of Virginia Baptist Orphanage.

Lynchburg, Va., August 24.—Dr. William E. Hatcher, aged seventy-eight, prominent in the Southern Baptist General Convention; for twenty-five years pastor of Grace Street Baptist Church, of Richmond, and president of Fork Union Military Academy, died there Saturday afternoon after a brief illness. His death was sudden.

Before the civil war he preached in Baltimore and later at Petersburg and Manchester, Va. He was the organizer of the Virginia Baptist Orphanage at Salem and president of its board of trustees. Among his surviving children are Dr. E. B. Hatcher, of Baltimore, and Miss Oris L. Hatcher, who is a member of the faculty of Bryn Mawr College. His widow also survives.

Dr. Hatcher was born in Bedford county, Va., July 25, 1834. His parents then lived in the house which had been the birthplace of Rev. J. B. Jeter. During his early life he was too frail to engage in heavy work on the farm and his youth was spent largely in reading such books as he could get hold of. At the age of eighteen he was able to teach school, and in 1854 he entered Richmond College, to remain there until the spring of 1856, when he received his bachelor's degree. The graduating

The State Auditor May Investigate Your Bank Account of February 1.

Another phase of his coming activities in the matter of tax reform was announced yesterday by State Auditor C. Lee Moore. This is that he will inquire into the amounts of money on deposit in banks as returned by the citizens of Virginia.

Mr. Moore states that he will call upon the State Bank Examiner for a statement as to the amount of money on deposit in each State bank in Virginia on February 13, 1912, the date on which the call for a statement nearest to February 1, when the taxes are levied, was made. He will also make a similar request of the Comptroller of the Currency, in Washington, for the total amount on deposit in national banks on the same day.

Fortified with these figures, the Auditor will compare them with the totals given in as bank deposits in each locality in the State. For instance, it will appear that one county returned in all \$25,000 of money on deposit. The bank statements will show that \$750,000 was on deposit in the banks of that county on February 13.

These two statements will be sent to the judge of the Circuit Court of the county or the Corporation Court of the city, with a request that the figures be brought to the attention of the grand jury.

In any event, a vigorous effort should be made to apprehend all house-breakers.

Continued From First Page... years and is clean and thick, yielding heavy cuttings about 40 days apart.

An abundance of lime is necessary. The best natural alfalfa soils of Nebraska and Colorado contain 2 per cent. of lime or more than eight tons in the top foot per acre.

On my own farm, which I have had some remarkable success with alfalfa, I find it best to put a little alfalfa seed with timothy and clover to inoculate the soil.

Because of its ability to gather the atmospheric nitrogen, many people assume that it needs no manure. This is not true for it cannot be started except on fertile, well manured land and after it is well established it responds to top dressings of manure in a manner out of all proportions to the plant food in the manure.

Extensive feeding experiments show that it has a milk or meat producing value almost or quite equal to wheat bran. Think of raising five tons of wheat bran to the acre at a cost of \$7.00 a ton and you will understand why so many people are trying alfalfa.

ESSENTIALS OF RURAL HIGHWAYS

The Perfect Modern Road Has Twelve Requisites.

Eliminate Grade Crossings.

According to Austin H. Fletcher, highway engineer of California, the essentials of a modern rural highway are as follows:

The elimination of all crossings of highways at grade with steam and electric railroads.

The construction of permanent culverts, gutters and ditches wherever they are needed to prevent water from standing on the roadbeds and on places adjacent to the road.

The construction of bridges of a permanent character, preferably of concrete, over all bridges to be used at least twenty-four feet wide in the clear and so designed that they will carry sixteen ton traction engines with a reasonable factor of safety.

A clear sight of at least 100 feet should be secured wherever it is practicable. The construction of permanent culverts, gutters and ditches wherever they are needed to prevent water from standing on the roadbeds and on places adjacent to the road.

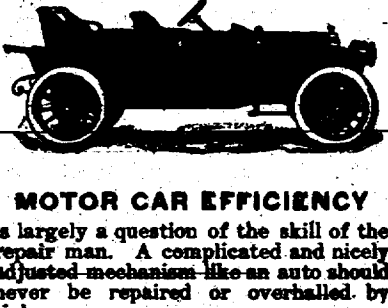
