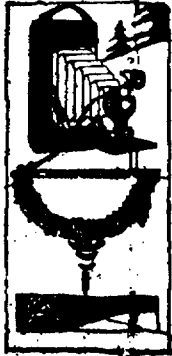

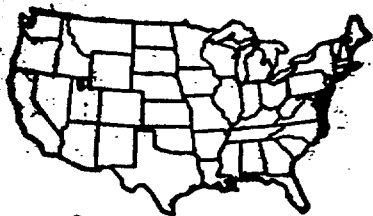

CLIFTON

Mr. George W. Tillett, one of the oldest residents of Clifton, died at his home near the village Tuesday night. His funeral was held Thursday afternoon from his late home, Rev. V. H. Council conducting the service. He was buried just across the road from his home, in the cemetery where he has been caretaker for many years.

Mr. Tillett was eighty-five years old and had spent his entire life here. He was a Confederate veteran, having served during the war between the states as a member of Mosby's command. He had been a member of the Clifton Baptist Church since his youth and a most faithful attendant until the later years of his life, when the infirmities of age compelled him to remain at home.

He is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Rudd Fullerton and Mrs. Robert Payne.

Rev. T. H. MacLeod preached at the Presbyterian Church at the usual hour on Sunday, the subject of his sermon being "The Bible." He told of the great loss to the Bible publishing society of its Bible plant, where all the Bibles of the orient were published, in Japan's dreadful earthquake. Pamphlets were circulated to inform the congregation of the great loss and asking for donations to help raise \$100,000 towards rebuilding the great plant.

An appeal was made in the Sunday School for funds or old clothing for the starving and freezing, orphaned and homeless of the eastern countries of the world through the Near East Relief.

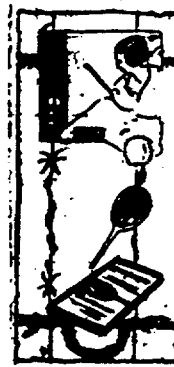
