### CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

#### ARTICLE ONE—NAME

#### ARTICLE THREE—MEMBERSHIP

Any person owning or interested in timber in Prince William County may become a member. Persons can be proposed for membership at any meeting by any member.

#### ARTICLE FOUR—OFFICERS

There shall be a president, a vice-president for each township, a secretary and treasurer, all to be elected by ballot. They shall be elected for one year and will serve until their places have been filled by another election. Officers shall serve without pay. The officers shall constitute a council.

#### ARTICLE FIVE—OFFICERS' DUTIES

The president shall preside at meetings, or in his absence, the council may select a vice-president or some other member of the club to preside. The secretaries shall keep the minutes and records of meetings. The council shall decide when meetings are to be held, and shall announce the meeting for the election of officers one month before they are held.

#### ARTICLE SIX—MEETINGS

At least one meeting shall be held a year. One meeting each year shall be designated as the executive meeting, at which the election of officers shall take place. Voting shall be by ballot, a majority of votes of members present being sufficient to constitute an election.

The dwelling was owned by Mrs. Robert S. Higgins, and occupied a site on Back River. Local historians say the building was more than 175 years old.

LESSON TEXT—Micah 4:1-3  
MEMORY VERSE.—"Nation Shall Not Lift up Sword Against Nation. Neither Shall They Learn War Anymore."—Micah 4:1-3  
TIME—Micah prophesied in the reigns of Jotham, Ahaz, and Hezekiah, who reigned (Hezekiah) from B.C. 740 to B.C. 690. Micah probably lived in his native town, Moreh-sath-gath, southwest of Jerusalem.  
PROPHET—Isaiah and Hosea.

## TO THE VOTERS OF GAINESVILLE DISTRICT NO. 2

Begging your indulgence for a brief space once more I wish to come before you through the medium of the press.

I have been hoping and expecting to hear through the same medium something from our Good Roads Committee at Haymarket, giving us data from actual facts and figures, telling and showing how much the macadam on the Carolina road, so far as finished, has cost per mile, and what will, probably, be the cost of building similar roads here in the future.

In the event the District bonds for \$60,000, as proposed, how many miles of our most important roads will it macadamize? On what roads and how much of each is it proposed to use it, and at what probable time?

About how much per \$100 of property would it be necessary to increase our tax levy to carry the loan, pay 5 per cent interest and create a sinking fund, etc?

Quoting from The Manassas Journal, of May 10, 1911, I find that: "The aggregate amount of taxes paid last year by Prince William County was \$34,882.17, including capitation taxes. This was paid on a ready of \$2,771,489, and a personality of \$1,005,934."

There are six Districts in the County.

I have no means at hand for ascertaining the exact official statistics for Gainesville District, but will suppose them, merely, for purposes of illustration.

How much of the \$34,882.17 we pay, and how much of it is capitation and dog tax I can only guess; but knowing that Gainesville pays more than one-sixth of the County taxes, for convenience will put it down at \$5,500, leaving out capitation and dog taxes.

If we vote to bond ourselves for \$60,000 for 30 years at 5 per cent interest—the best we could expect—the interest would be \$3,000 a year for 30 years, or, until the debt was reduced by paying off some of the bonds. This does not provide for a sinking fund or paying principal; but the increase in real estate and other farming values would all combine to raise more taxes without increasing the tax levy, and as the population increased so would the number of taxation taxpayers.

At present rates our taxes, I think, are about \$1.15 on the \$100 of property, or one cent and three-twentiths of a cent on each dollar.

If the present rate of \$1.15 brings a tax of \$5,500, to raise \$3,000 more from the same property valuation would necessitate an increase of 62.81 cents on the \$100, which would most likely be put at about 65 cents to cover contingencies and losses. The 65 cents added to the \$1.15 would make the rate \$1.80 per \$100, or one cent and four-fifths of a cent on each \$1.

A tax bill of \$75 at the \$1.15 rate would be increased at a 65 cent addition rate \$42.39, making a total of \$117.39. A \$40 tax at present levy would then be \$62.61, and a \$25 tax bill would \$39.15, and all others in proportion.

I hope some one who is better qualified and equipped with statistics and figures will take it up and explain it more fully, and am in error, correct me and show me where I am wrong.

I wish it thoroughly understood, because it is an absolute fact, that I am not doing this to defeat the movement to bond the District for road improvement, but because I do not think it the right, or proper way to get it, to try to get the people who do not fit it out for themselves to give it their moral support and commit themselves to a thing without ever an idea of what the probable results will be.

here are some persons who are opposed to bonding on any yet proposed. A great many think well of the idea if it is practicable, but want to understand it thoroughly before voting; and there are some, it seems, who are willing and to bond the District on almost any terms that will bring the ready money.

It is certainly the right and best thing to do to make our roads and permanent as fast as possible and practical; and if we people of our District decide to bond ourselves for the purpose, I will be found trying to do my part as faithfully and efficient as I can.
