There are two principal theories concerning the historical nature of the Book of Bather: one, that it is a veritable history; the other, that it is a historical romanse founded on fact, like Shakespeare's Julius Caesar and Henry VIII., or like Scott's novels, or Homer's great epics. While there are a number of serious difficulties. yet there are few if any unanswerable arguments against its being a true history. Xerxes is the Greek shortened form of the Abssuerus of Eather, as York, for instance, is a shortened form of the Latin Eboracum. He began to reign B. C. 485 and ruled for 20 years. We can best understand Eather by means of those parts of his history which reveal his character. Xerxes at the very beginning of his reign completed the conquest of Egypt which his father Darius had begun. On his return he immediately began to prepare for the invasion of Europe, and especially of Greece.

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

Such a venture would have been ridionious, if not impossible, a year or two ago, on account of the risk of losing everyone of these animals from tick fever. But now that that parish is practically free of tieks the risk has been elimin. ated, as there are no ticks present (in that part of the parish where they expect to introduce these sells) to transmit the fever. "And that which applies to the in-

troduction of beef bulls, may also apply to buils of the dairy breeds. As soon as we rid our parish of ticks, we can introduce either, or both, with tennesity, to improve both our beef and dairy industries. The Corn Show in Manassas on November 17 will establish the basis. Sentiment throughout the County favors the founding of a Fair as a permanent institution, according to expressions of leading farmers. The Fair would exploit all our resources. and particularly our principal activity—agriculture. . The element of competition would lead to greater achievement.

PATRONS' DAY

PATRONS' DAY last Friday demonstrated its usefulness in the public schools of Prince William County. The observance brought patrons, teachers and pupils together in the school rooms and on the school grounds to formulate and to execute plans for advance ment of a common cause. In recognition that their interests in an educational sense are identical they developed a greater reciprocity that will result in raising school standards. The discussion of educational topics, the organization of Leagues for improvement of a man with a depleted purse. school property, and the social features all make for progress.
