It is said that the pen is mightier than the sword but if one could just see some of the correspondence that finds its way into a newspaper office the popular verdict would be that the typewriter has got the pen beaten to a frazzle.

Of course the Anti-Wilson politicians profess to believe that the Governor had his satchel containing his "private papers" stolen in

an attempt to make him a statesman who has no skeletons in his closet. They wink and laugh ominously with reference to the several hundred miles, has been attended by untold loss of life and property as the great flood swept with fury down the country's chief waterway to the Gulf of Mexico.

The country for miles around has been submerged to an alarming extent and thousands of people are homeless and fleeing for their lives. Cairo, Memphis and Hickman, Ky., are among the most distressingly stricken cities.

The National Government, and the Red Cross society under the supervision of Miss Mabel Boardman, are rendering all aid possible.

Army rations have been sent by the Government on the President's orders and the Quartermaster's department has detailed representatives to the scenes of the disaster. Upon their report will depend such further aid, as in the opinion of the department may be necessary.

The war department is struggling with the problem forced upon it by the urgent call for tents to shelter the flood sufferers, owing to a recent act of Congress calling on the department to furnish a great number of tents for the Confederate reunion at Macon, Ga., on May 1.

Stirring reports of daring rescues of refugees in the flood swept territory have reached Memphis, and one thousand or more persons marooned in a town in Arkansas, have been brought by the rescuers to that city.

The crisis of the tremendous flood was imminent in the situation south of Memphis yesterday, and if the dikes of Arkansas, Mississippi and North Carolina will hold for another short period, it is believed the crisis will have passed. That period will decide whether scenes of suffering and loss of life and property, which has marked the distress along the upper Mississippi, will be repeated in the fertile valleys south of Memphis.

COMMENDABLE MOVE

A MOVEMENT is on foot to induce the Board of Supervisors of Fairfax county to levy a special tax for the relief of maimed, disabled, afflicted and indigent Confederate soldiers living in said county and for the needy and indigent widows of such soldiers, in accordance with authority given boards of supervisors in all counties of the State by an act passed by the Legislature, March 14, 1908.

The law provides that a levy of not less than five nor more than fifteen cents on the real and personal property of the county may be levied for the purpose stated.

It is claimed that less attention should be paid to some less urgent expenditures made annually and that the beneficiaries, under the act referred to, who ruined their prospects and usefulness, physically, in defense of the South should receive more consideration in their declining years and lost of ability to care for themselves and their families. Would it not be well for Prince William to follow the example of her sister county in providing a contribution to the State's pension for the support of these battle-scarred veterans.

NEW INDUSTRY FOR CLIFTON

THREE carloads of laurel sprouts, in squares of about one foot were shipped from Clifton to the Wauley & Smith company, of Long Island, N. Y., last week. An extensive shipment, it is said, was made from the same point last spring to the Rockefellers.

The laurel, we are told, is used for transplanting and great care is taken through inspectors sent to examine the laurel beds which stand near Clifton, to prevent any disease of the plant being transmitted to the locality to which these shipments are being made.

The inspector made an examination of the Clifton laurel beds last spring and found them free from disease and his certificate holds good for a period of one year. The laurel is shipped in double-deck cars and each car is loaded to its full capacity. Laurel abounds in great quantities in Prince William county and the payment of this new industry should be looked into.

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LETTER FROM
REV. J. K. ERIRD

THEODORE ROOSEVELT
PLEASING TO TRUSTS

EXPRESSES HIMSELF WELL PLEASED

Former Pastor of Bethel Evangelical Lutheran Church in This Place Describes Conditions in His New Field of Labor.

Saddle River, N. J., Apr. 8.

To MY FRIENDS:

I am now about settled in my new home, and, according to promise, will write this letter for publication.

This is a fine country, very thickly settled with a good class of people, except some foreigners who come out from New York City to work for the settlers; and many of them are not bad.

It seems, being so near the great city of New York and her smaller places, we would find a great deal of lawlessness; but people don't seem to take time to commit crime and get drunk. Everybody is at work and doing well. I have not seen a single sign of intemperance. I was in Patterson, a city of 140,000 inhabitants, last week, and did not see a single man under the influence of strong drink. Men drink, I suppose, for the bars rooms are there, and therefore temptation is before them, and if they get too much they are not trying to show it. The little borough, Saddle River seems to be a truly moral place in every respect.

The roads here are excellent; all are macadamized and there

are no mud holes except with

When a man starts out with a load he knows he will make his trip if life lasts. Some very heavy auto trucks run through the country delivering goods for the large merchants; and because of good roads merchants of the cities, like Patterson, eight to ten miles distant, deliver all goods at your door, from a yeast cake to the finest and largest article you buy. Meat wagons, fruit wagons, vegetable wagons, fish and oyster wagons, bakery wagons and laundry wagons and sometimes auto wagons, run all through this country because

of the good roads. If Taft will bring us and go away from your home to do your shopping unless you want to see the fashions.

To give you an idea of these conditions here it took seven two-horse loads to draw my goods through the streets of Manassas to the railroad, and then one of the drivers complained that we were loading him too heavy; he was afraid he could not pull the load. The same goods were moved here two miles from the railroad with three two-horse loads, and the teams trotted a part of the way. This shows the difference between Virginia roads and New Jersey roads.

Men get to work on your roads. It will pay you well. I was told a few days ago that a gentleman from near here went down to Eastern Virginia prospecting for land. He came back disgusted and said: "No, I don't want land in a country where an empty wagon makes a good load for two horses." That is the value put upon your lands without good roads. What if it does cost you some money? You make it up in the saving of time in traveling; saves your horses, your vehicles, and increases the valuation of your lands two-fold.

My church work is very pleasant and interesting to me. I take a walk with a kind neighbor, dressed in a beautiful church and have a comfortable parsonage on Saddle River, where I can rest when I have time. I am perfectly satisfied, so far.
