

EWELL CAMP OF CONFEDERATE VETS. ORGANIZED MARCH 26, 1890

Woman of Kind and Motherly Character. Mrs. Mary L. Thomas, 77 years old, died in the home of her daughter, Mrs. Ross Lewis, in Montpelier, this State, on Monday night of last week.

The funeral took place on the following Wednesday afternoon, the Rev. T. W. Hooper, pastor of the Presbyterian, and E. W. Winfrey, pastor of the Baptist church, of Culpeper, officiating, and interment was in the Presbyterian churchyard at Mitchell Station, the former home of the deceased.

Mrs. Thomas, who was a resident of Manassas during the long period of her son, L. Boling Thomas' position as agent for the Southern Railway Company, at this place, was a woman of kind and motherly characteristics, and was beloved by all with whom she came in social contact.

The death of her husband, soon followed by the death of her son, through tuberculosis, several years ago, weighed heavily upon the grief stricken wife and mother, causing her to gradually succumb to the weight of sorrow and disappointment.

GENERAL YOUNG MADE COMMANDER

General Bennett Young, of Louisville, Ky., commander of the Army of Tennessee, was chosen commander-in-chief of the United Confederate Veterans at the recent union in Mason, Ga.

After the withdrawals of Generals Walker and Van Zant from the race for commander-in-chief, General Young's election was made unanimous. General Walker was then made honorary commander-in-chief. Chattanooga, Tennessee, was selected as the place for the next re-union city, in 1913.

The invitation of General Trimble, commander-in-chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, to merge the Blue and the Gray in a celebration at Gettysburg in July, 1913, was unanimously and enthusiastically accepted. The discussion of acceptance of General Trimble's invitation was brief, and such objections as were made were purely of technical grounds.

One or two delegates declared that the official endorsement of the convention was not in conformance with the constitution of the United Confederate Veterans, and that they did not think it wise. Generals Walker and Carr, besides others, promptly rose to declare that the breach between the Union and Confederate soldiers was forever healed; that nowhere could be found in the terms of the Confederacy, animus toward the soldiers of the Union, and that the Gettysburg re-union would forever wipe out what fragments of ill feeling there might possibly be left. Scarcely had these broad-minded Southerners ceased speaking before the disgruntled element made haste to ally themselves with the overwhelming specific advocates and the resolution accepting the G. A. R.'s invitation was passed with a unanimous vote.

This action of the United Confederate Veterans is, in every sense commendable, as the passage of fifty years, since the great struggle between the contending armies of the North and the South which terminated at Appomattox, should be sufficient to dispel all animosity, especially from a Christian standpoint.

It has been planned for the party to go to Washington by the way of Fredericksburg and Manassas, and to return by way of Warrenton, Orange and Culpeper. Whichever route is found the better by reason of distance and ease of construction, will be selected.


