LAYING COMPETITION

The Agricultural College of the state of Missouri in its poultry department held a laying competition, open to hens of the world. last year that has proven some theories and brought out a number of new and valuable facts that will be of great help in the future development of this billion dollar industry. There were 131 pens of five hens each in the contest and they were from 25 states. Nearly every standard breed was represented and one pen o the splendid ding made by the heavier breeds. Rhode Island a fraction over 208 eggs in the year. White Wyandottes won second place with 208 eggs each during the year. The hen that laid the greatest number of eggs was a White Plymouth Rock with a record of 281 good sized well shaped eggs. Second individual record was made by a R. I. Red with 255 eggs to her credit, and a Barred Plymouth Reck was third with a record of 245 eggs.

The birds were fed three times a day, in deep litter, grain mixed as follows: Cracked corn, 200 pounds: whole wheat. 200 pounds; heavy whole oats, 100 pounds. A mash was kept in open 200 pounds; beef scrap, 150 pounds; alfalfa meal, 75 pounds; gluten meal, 50 pounds, oil meal, 25 pounds; sait, 8 pounds, and charcoal. 25 pounds.

When it is remembered that the census statistics state that the average hen lays only 80 eggs per year the performance of these hens seems quite remarkable and goes to prove that there is money in the egg business if properly managed. The entire flock of 635 here in the contest averaged 134 eggs each for the twelve months.
