



## Your Tax Burdens Will Be Made Heavier IS PRETTY ORNAMENT By State-Wide Prohibition

No voter should be deluded into the belief that State-wide prohibition can be adopted in Virginia without an increase of taxation. if the various departments of the State government are maintained as they are at present. It may be added that the people of Virginia will not permit any damage to the various State institutions, but that on the other hand, they will demand and expect of their public officials such improvements as a great and constantly growing kind or other, and Commonwealth needs. Hence, if State-wide prohibition is voted on the people of the State, in a moment of hysteria, taxes must neces- ployed for goldfish, sarily be increased to cover the amount of money that the licensed liquor traffic is now paying into the treasury. The adoption of State-wide prohibition will strip the treasury of every dollar that is now being paid into it by the licented traffic. We can very readily ascertain the amount of money that the licensed liquor traffic is paying into the treasury of Virginia. round numbers it is \$75,000 a year. North Carolina and Tennessee are giving State-wide prohibition a trial, and crime has increased in both States. Official records show this to be a fact. Petty crime has steadily increased in that State under prohibition, and there has been large increases, consequently, in the cost of prosecuting criminals. Failing to secure any reductions in this direction North Carolina has been borrowing money and increasing taxes to make up the deficits. The next Legislature of that State will face a deficit in State revenue of more than \$1,000,000.


