MRS. SCHULTZ WILL PROBATED

DOCUMENT DATED JAN. 21st, 1913. H. Thornton Davies and William N. Lipscomb, Appointed Executors—Number of Beneficiaries Named.

The following is a copy of the will of the late Mrs. Louise Schultz, dated January 21, 1913, which has just been probated:

"In the name of God, Amen, I, Louise Schultz, of the Town of Manassas, Prince William county, Virginia, being of sound and disposing mind and memory do make, declare and publish this as my last will and testament, hereby revoking all wills and codicils heretofore executed by me:

I do hereby nominate William N. Lipscomb and Hawes Thornton Davies as executors of this, my last will and testament. 2nd. At my death, all of my property, of every kind and description (except certain articles hereinafter disposed of), mixed, real bonds or mortgages, I desire converted into money by my said executors, who are given full and complete power and authority to sell and convey any and all real estate of which I may die, seized and possessed, and after the payment of my just debts and funeral expenses by my said executors, I direct that my executors shall pay the following bequests:

- a. To Clara Doermann, the sum of one hundred dollars. b. To Joanna Doermann, the sum of one hundred dollars. c. To Florence-Lion, the sum of one hundred dollars. d. To Mary Lynch, the sum of five hundred dollars. e. To Hawes Davies, son of Hawes Thornton Davies, one hundred dollars. f. To Jenkin Davies, son of Hawes Thornton Davies, one hundred dollars. g. After the payment of the said legacies I desire my said executors to divide the residue into seventeen equal parts and pay out the same as follows: a. One-seventeenth to my niece, Augusta Henri, wife of H. Henri, in fee. b. One-seventeenth to W. Harold Lipscomb, in fee. c. One-seventeenth to Mammie H. Lipscomb, in fee. d. Four-seventeenths to Theodosia Schultz, in fee. e. Two-seventeenths to William F. Bahlman, in fee. f. Four-seventeenths to Anna C. Bahlman, in fee. g. Four-seventeenths to Hawes P. Davies, trustee, to have and hold the same in trust as follows: The same to be invested by said trustee and the income to be paid to Eveline Dunningway, known as Lena Schultz, now the wife of Joseph Howard Dodge, for and during her natural life; at her death or in the event of her not surviving me the said fund is to be paid by said trustee to my niece Augusta Henri, in fee. I also constitute my said niece my residuary legatee to whom I give and bequeath everything not otherwise disposed of.

4th. I further give to the following parties the articles named: (x) To Mary D. Lipscomb a small rosewood table, a ku-ku clock, a large looking-glass in a walnut double frame and a small venician water-bottle which is very old.

(w) To Theodosia Schultz a large round walnut extension table, four walnut chairs with leather seats, a stereoscope with all pictures and two pictures, and
