In return Webster had thanked him and offered him the ring, which was considerably sent to the widow at the close of the war. The body was recovered from the enemy's lines under a flag of truce and conveyed to Boston, where it lay in state on September 9, in Faneuil Hall, and was buried the next day with military ceremonies in which Governor Andrew and the Mayor of Boston took part.

Organized in April-May, 1861, the Twelfth Massachusetts, which at the time of the battle was in Rickett's division and McDowell's corps of the Army of the Virginia, had seen little fighting, and had lost its first men but twenty days before in the battle of Cedar Mountain; but its Colonel had endeavored himself to the regiment, and had demonstrated its ability in the field. Under the date of June 26, marking the close of its first year's history, the diarist of the command notes that it had marched 750 miles, on duty that was seldom dangerous but always fatiguing.

"The weather had been almost uniformly bad, the roads—with a few exceptions—execrable." On several occasions, especially under McClellan, its mobility had been severely tested. At Cedar Mountain it had been brought into action under a heavy fire of musketry and light artillery, and had suffered from the fact that a runaway battery, dashing through its ranks, had separated it from the remainder of the brigade. It was composed mainly of Boston men, with recruits from New-ton, Lexington, and other outlying villages, and one of its companies, commanded by a graduate of the Boston Latin School, was in part outfitted by that institution. During most of its early history it chafed continually to be put into action. Its final entrance, thanks to the blundering of Halleck and Pope, was under circumstances that made glory hard to achieve. It was fortunate alone in its corps commander, McDowell being so far superior to Sigel or Banks that his command was pronounced by Pope to be the "only corps that is reliable at all."

The indecision which marked Pope's direction of the second battle of Bull Run is well reflected in the regimental history of the Twelfth. On August 25 it was marched several miles, and on the 26th marched back again. "Pope," the historian remarks, was getting badly mixed. Lee was hurrying to join Jackson; while Pope's divisions were here, there and everywhere. To cap all, the ubiquitous Stuart took advantage of a dark, rainy night and raided Pope's headquarters, severing communication with Washington and adding to the confusion. On the 27th a command march was again countermanded. On the 28th Rickett's division was ordered through Thoroughfare Gap to join its corps between Centerville and Manassas, and, after marching all day of the 29th, was near Manassas on the morning of the 30th. At one o'clock it received orders to support Heintzelman and Reno in an attack on the enemy's left, and in common with the whole of Pope's army, was repulsed by a spirited counter-attack on the right by Longstreet. In the night of the engagement Col. Fletcher Webster, cut off for a few minutes from his command, according to one account, waving his sword and cheering on his men, according to another, was

partially wounded by a fire. The adjutant of the division and two privates assisted him a short distance to the rear and remained with him until taken prisoner. He was left alone to die, still conscious and suffering greatly, but aware that his end was near. In later years the return of a ring to Mrs. Webster revealed some further circumstances of his death. Postal savings increase on account of European war. The war in Europe is proving a big boon to postal savings in this country. From the very day hostilities opened across the seas postal-savings receipts began to increase by leaps and bounds and withdrew fell off, a result quite contrary to the predictions of many well-informed persons who in their imagination, saw lines of feverish depositors at post-office pay windows anxious to again return their savings to the boot-leg and body-belt depositories whence they came before intrusted to Uncle Sam. But the forecasters failed to reckon on the absolute confidence of the American citizen, regardless of the flag that first met his eyes, in the ability and purpose of the Government to carry out its obligations, not only among the nations of the earth, but with the humblest citizen of our land.

Two important results have followed; thousands of people, largely of foreign birth, accustomed to send their savings abroad, are now patrons of our postal-savings system; and enormous sums of actual cash have been released for commercial uses among our own people at a time when the need for every available dollar is pressing. The growth of postal savings in the United States has been steady and healthy and the system has filled an important gap between the tin-can depository and the factory paymaster. On July 1, when affairs were running smoothly here and abroad and the transmission of money across the Atlantic was safe and expeditious there was approximately \$43,000,000 of postal savings standing to the credit of about 338,000 depositors. Since then over \$10,000,000 of deposits have been added and the number of depositors has increased enormously. This unprecedented gain is the more striking when it is considered that the net gain in the last three months is larger than the gain for the entire fiscal year 1914. Scores of offices have done more postal-savings business since the war has been going on than was done by them during the previous existence of the service. The increases are confined to no special localities, but have been felt in every nook and corner of the country. New York City alone made a gain in September of more than a million, while Brooklyn showed a relatively big increase. Chicago reported a larger gain in the past three months than for the previous twelve months. More than 7,000 new accounts were opened during the period, bringing the number of depositors in that city up to over 21,000. The unexpected increase in postal-savings business has not only

added greatly to the general administrative duties of the system but has brought up many new and interesting problems which have called for the careful personal consideration of Postmaster General Burleson and Governor Dockery, Third Assistant Postmaster General. But their task has been lightened somewhat by the promptness of depository banks in furnishing additional security to meet the abnormal deposits. A number of the very largest banks in the country, which have heretofore declined to qualify as depositories for postal-savings funds, are now among the eager applicants for them.

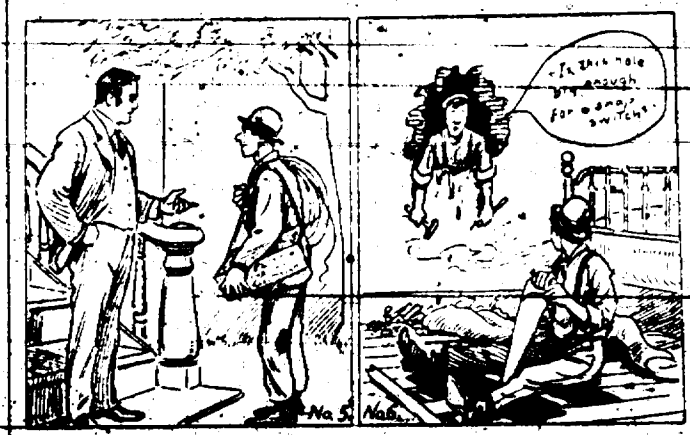

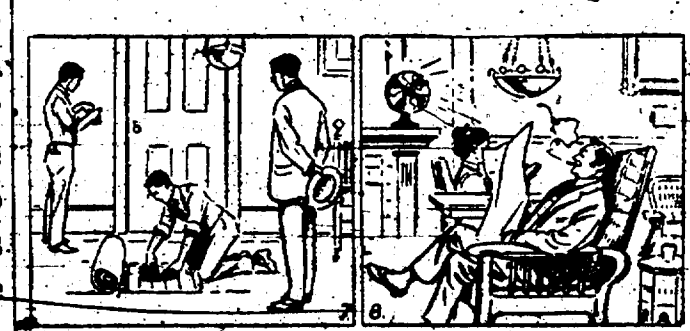

Picture No. 7—Responsible Electrical Contractor. "Careful work is necessary and be sure to put everything back just as you found it."

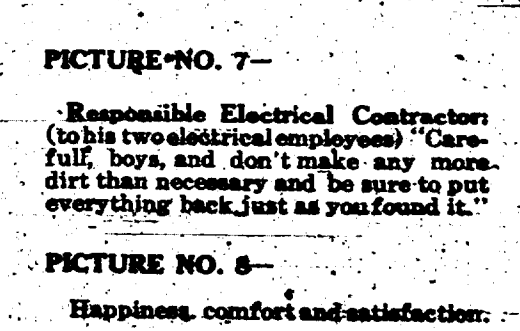
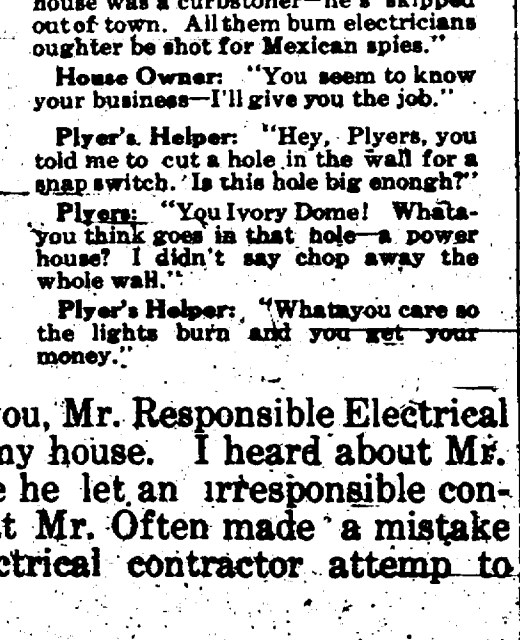

### BAR ILLICIT LOVE FROM P. O.

Port Huron Inspectors Will Compel Dealers of General Delivery to Give Reasons.

Port Huron, Mich.—As a result of a visit of post office inspectors to this city to investigate alleged abuse of the general delivery system, new regulations have been adopted and the people who have been in the custom of receiving their mail through the general delivery windows will be required to fill out a card stating name and address, as well as the reasons for getting mail at the window instead of by the city delivery.

The inspectors, it is said, criticized the class of people who were receiving their mail at the general delivery window and it is alleged they found that many married women were carrying on affairs with other men and that high school girls were carrying on correspondence with young men who were under the parental ban.

No minor will be given mail hereafter through the general delivery window.

Young Philadelphia Woman Abandoned Skirts in Overalls. Earns "Decent" Wage.

Philadelphia—Eugene H. Disinger, himself as a man in order to catch a woman to support herself decently, a woman giving the name of Mary Gray, and her address as 200 East Thirtieth street, New York, was arrested in the fashionable Chestnut Hill section.

"My father and mother died in New York when I was only twelve years old," said Miss Gray. "I was thrown into the world to earn my living. I dressed as one of my sex.

"However, I found it extremely hard to earn a decent living. Then I decided to act as a man, dress like a man and work in the same way. This I did several years ago and have been able to earn fair wages ever since."

### RELIC IS GIVEN TO NAVY

Historic Constellation Cup Presented to Commodore Kearney, Gifted to Government.

Washington.—Secretary Daniels sent to James Lawrence Kearney, son of the late Commodore Lawrence Kearney of Peppin Harbor, N. J., a cup representing his donation of a letter from his father to Commodore Kearney, which was presented to the commodore by the officers of the Constellation in 1843.

The cup is of china, four and one-half inches high and three and one-half inches in diameter and is artistically decorated with a picture scene representing the ship Constellation and Boston lying at anchor in a Chesapeake harbor.

The representations of the ships, it is said, are wonderfully accurate.

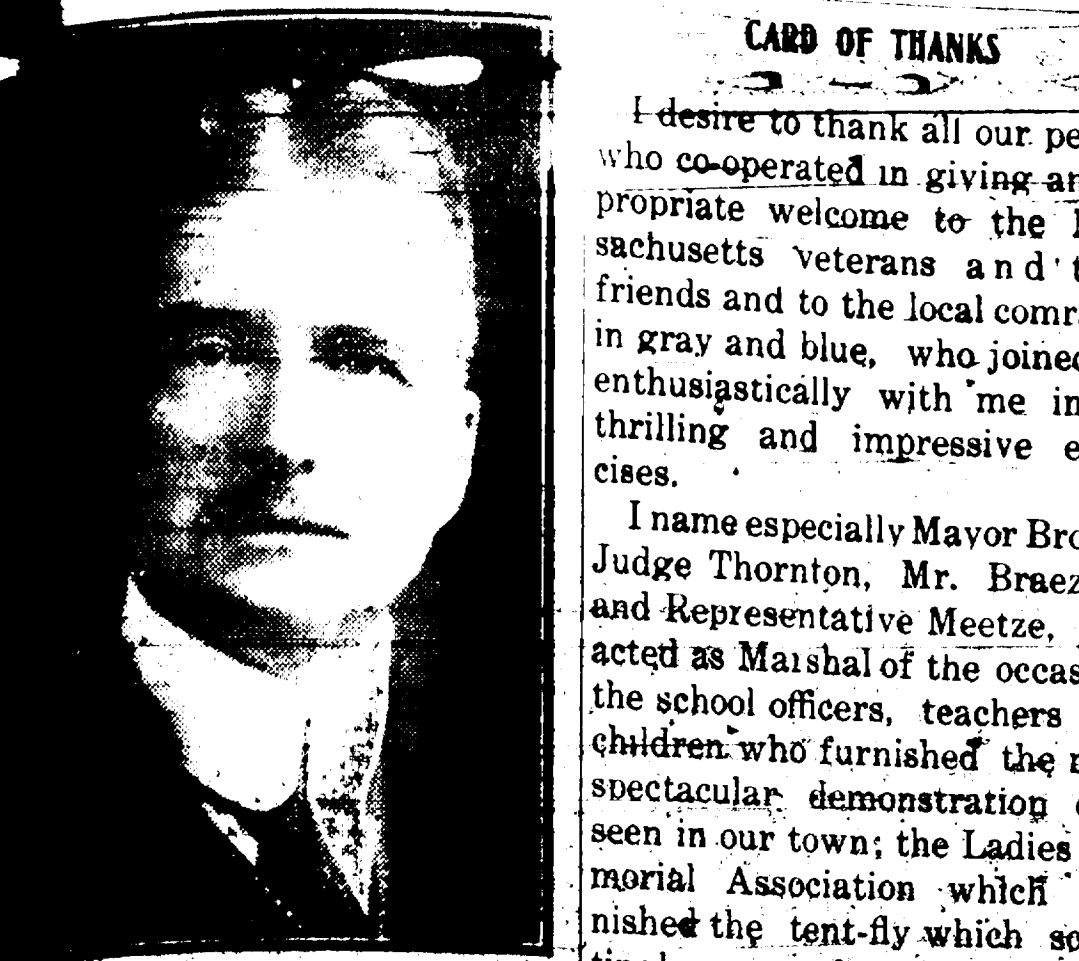
