The premiums of the association are open to the competition of Prince William and adjoining counties.

Entries will positively close September 15, 1919, but should be sent as long before that date as possible. This rule will be strictly adhered to. All exhibits must be in the hall at 9 o'clock a. m. Tuesday, September 23, as judging commences punctually at 10 a. m. Tuesday. The building for the reception of poultry will be open and ready to receive exhibits Monday, September

All specimens sent will be cared for, id returned at the close of the exhion; it will, therefore, be unnecessary the owners to accompany them. All mass of transportation must be preand all specimens entered at the of owners. The Association will not be responsible for loss by fire or otherwise, but will exercise all possible vigilence in the care of exhibits and police at angements of the hall.

No specimens will be allowed in the hall except those which have been duly entered in the books of the association, and the entry fee and express charges paid. This will be strictly adhered to.

Entry for turkeys, geese, and ducks will be 35 cents each. Exhibitors will furnish their own coops in these classes and all will be judged single.

The entry fee for poultry in competition is 35 cents; breed-in pen, \$1.00. This includes coop fee, feed, and atapance. All specimens entered for provided must be shown in coops there are not entry association, unless show.

The judges are sictly prohibited from making known heir award except through the superitendent. Any person attempting to interere with the judges in their decision by letter or otherwise, will be excluded from competition and exhibition.

The decision of the judges, after being ravified by the board of managers shall be final.

Prizes are not to be awarded for birds impaired in value for breeding purpose. The American standard of perfection is to be the guide in judging.

All fowls are to be shown singly or

All fowls are to be shown singly or in breeding pens; a breeding pen to be one cock or cockerel and four hens or pullets. Old and young pen will not compete. Birds entered singly cannot compete as pen also. Pens must be entered separately.

The association reserves the right to put more than one specimen in a coop, provided the same belongs to one exhibitor, thus: Two females of one variety, or male and female; but in mo case will two males be put together in the same coop.

Labels will be sent for each entry. The label must have the sender's name and address legibly written thereon, and name of the express company for the return journey. If from accident the association labels do not arrive in time, send exhibits without them, and the superintendent will make duplicates. When more than one specimen is sent in a coop, each entry must be properly divided and separately labeled. Unhealthy specimens will not be exhibited, but will be returned to the owners at their expense.

There must be five or more entries in a class to win first money. Where there are less than five entries in a class, two, three or four entries shown first premium may be awarded and if so second money paid. Where there is only one entry in class first premium blue ribbon will be awarded and money prize withheld.

All specimens must be banded and band numbers properly entered on the entry blank. All birds found not banded will be banded by the superintendent at a charge of five cents each, to be paid by the exhibitor.

During the exhibition no specimen will be removed, except by consent of the superintendent or general manager.


