On April 27, 1878, a large crowd of people gathered at the First Methodist Church in Atlanta, Georgia, to witness the trial of Bishop Jackson, of the Southern Conference, for heresy. The most important subject of discussion will be the renewal of friendly relations between the Northern and Southern branches of the church. Bishop Eaton presided, and Judge Jackson of the Supreme Court welcomed the Conference.

There is considerable apprehension in Chicago and possibly in other cities of a communistic outbreak. It is rumored that no organization exists, save in the labor against capital, an existing in the above named city of seven thousand, in number well equipped with arms and determined to resist all authority until their demands are complied with. We hope no such state of things exists, as last year's outbreaks furnish sufficient grounds for apprehending the worst.

The Richmond Whig is misinformed respecting Judge Slocum as being present at Congress in the English interest.
