

HERE AND THERE

Claim to 14,000,000 acres of land in Texas and Oklahoma, including the cities of Tulsa and Oklahoma City and principally the Burke Burnett oil fields, was recently filed in the Supreme Court in behalf of the Cherokee Indians, supported by a government patent issued by President Van Buren, and certified as authentic by the interior department. The patent was filed by John M. Taylor, a grand nephew of Gen. Zachary Taylor, as attorney for the Cherokees. He said the patent was discovered accidentally among the papers of a deceased chief of the tribe.

Former Empress Augusta Victoria of Germany died on April 11, at Doorn, Holland. By a strange coincidence, the end came just one year after she left by Col. House, and that entitled "The Fundamentals of Peace." The book is said to be a labor of love, and that the former president knows with the pleasure of its contents.

SECRET NOT TOLD

Bodyguard of Jefferson Davis, Dies Without Revealing Hiding Place of Confederate Seal.

A recent Times-Dispatch story gives the following interesting account of an old servant of Jefferson Davis, who hid the Great Seal of the Confederacy for his master and took the secret of his hiding place to the grave with him. The article follows:

Taking with him to the grave the secret of the whereabouts of the great seal of the Confederacy, which he hid as Jefferson Davis was captured, Jas. E. Jones, the colored bodyguard of the president of the Confederate States...

Through his long life with his late master, in the government service in Washington, Jones would never reveal what became of the Confederate seal. "Marse Jeff" had bidden that he never tell—and he never did. Veterans of Union and Confederate armies, newspaper writers, curious spectators and curious hunters, from time to time urged Jones to reveal where he buried the great seal. They argued that the war between the States was far in the past, and the seal should be produced for the inspection of the younger generation of today and the generations that are to follow in a united country. Always he shook his head, and to the end he maintained his silence.

The colored bodyguard was with Jefferson Davis when his capture was effected. In fact, he is said to have warned his master of the approach of the enemy, but President Davis did not escape in time. Jones accompanied President Davis to Fort Monroe, where he was placed in prison.
