

PLAY PAIR WITH HOME MERCHANTS.

Do you realize how unfair many a man and woman is with grocer and clothier and butcher? The word "unfair" is used advisedly, too, in this instance

As the fancy strikes, or the need prods, you go to the retailers you deal with, place your orders, and, many times, say—"Charge these items, please." And then, apparently, many forget all about paying for the merchandise for several months. Let us see what the retailers do in this interval.

There are very few wholesale houses today that are not on th thirty-day or sixty-day credit basis. And when a manufacturer or a jobber says that the invoices of goods he has shipped must be settled in thirty days he means it. If the retailer values his credit standing, he takes the terms of the manufacturers to heart. strains to meet his bills, and often is forced to decline ordering muchneeded merchandise because of the uncertainty of having funds in your tires begin to show consider-

hand with which to pay the bill when it becomes due. Your retailer must respect the terms granted by those with whom established vulcanizing business he deals. - Is it fair play for you to pay little or no attention to the terms on which he sells goods on credit?

It is true that there are times when a person is face to face with adversity, and in such cases your retailer is found to be sympathetic in a practical way. The dealer who does not willingly grant an extension of time for payment to those who really need it, is rarely met with. But the great bulk of those who do not pay their bills when Manassas they become due are able to do so. In most cases it is due to carelessness and a lack of appreciation of what the average retailer is really up against.

Today, when loans are difficult to negotiate, your retailer can not step up to his banker and ask for more and more money to put into his business in order to carry on his books a far greater amount of credit than his business justifies. The point is soon reached when the negligence of so many buyers to meet their obligations with the local dealers when they become due, begins to tax the business of the local dealers unduly. These retailers, whose businesses are of vital importance to your comfort and convenience (far more than the average individual takes into consideration), should not have to send out statement after statement without response.

Remember, it costs money to do business these days far more than it used to. And no merchant enjoys the old-time credit priviliges once so lavishly extended, though many a patron of the local retailer takes his or her good time to pay a bill that should have been paid when due.
