MAKE READY FOR THE BIG DAY.

One week from today, Prince William citizens should turn out en masse for the national meeting and picnic to be held on the old Bull Run battlefields, when, with appropriate inaugural exercises, the movement to make a great memorial park of these historic fields will be officially launched. Let us consider for a moment what the establishment of this park will mean to Prince William:

First, it will stand as a perpetual monument to the valor of the Sons of the South, ever reminding our children, our children's children and all generations to come, that here MEN fought and bled and died for a principle and for love of their homeland.

Second, it will do more to hasten the coming of good roads for Prince William than anything else short of the voting of a good-sized county bond issue. And it will insure, almost certainly, the maintenance of these roads, which is just as important an item as getting them.

Third, it will give us Prince Williamians a feeling of pride whenever we hear or see references made to the battlefields of the first and second Manassas. At present, while there is ample reason, it is a little embarrassing for us to have to explain why there has been such a delay in rightly honoring the sacred soil, twice drenched with the blood of the South's great heroes.

Lay your business and household cares aside on the 21st, the sixtieth anniversary of the first battle of Manassas. Take the family to the old Henry House for a day's outing, and drink of the inspiration that should come from this gathering, and by your presence show to the Southland and the entire nation, that Prince William is back of this movement and in every possible way is going to help "put it over."

WORTHY OF THE READER'S CONSIDERATION.

What W. L. Heuser says in another column of this issue of the NEWS should be of particular interest to the taxpayers of Manassas, Brentsville and Gainesville districts. If what Mr. Heuser claims is borne out by facts, and I would not suggest it is not, in the matter of expenditures of the taxpayers' money for road improvements in Prince William for the past few years, the districts of Occoquan, Dumfries and Coles have certainly profited unduly at the expense of the property owners in the other three districts.

Even though you may not be interested in what Mr. Heuser has to say about the decision recently made regarding the improvement of the Carolina road in Gainesville district, which gets first attention in his letter, read on until the last two paragraphs are reached. These two paragraphs deal with a matter that has been up for informal discussion for some little while—a matter that should receive the attention of all Prince William citizens.

If the three districts of the lower part of the county have been getting more than their proper share of the road improvement tax money, the error should be corrected. Prince William should always be looked upon as a unit, not as six competitive districts, each trying to get the best of the other five, of three contriving to gain the advantage, in any way, over the other three.

To my personal knowledge, Mr. Heuser has given this expenditure of county money for the improvement of Prince William's roads, very close study. The statements made in his article and the conclusions reached, are worthy of the reader's careful consideration.

AM I RIGHT OR AM I WRONG?

A few Sundays back I had the pleasure of hearing a sermon that deserves comment—favorable comment. I will not attempt to report this sermon in full or even give it in part, but the theme was cooperation and the crying need for members of each denomination to recognize that members of other denominations may be right, too.

Rev. A. Stuart Gibson has very ably compared the different churches to a big family where, while the individual members of this family may and are to be expected to differ on the best manner of accomplishing the details of the family work, the progress of the family is largely to be measured by the extent all work together, each member recognizing all the while that little differences of opinion are not of paramount importance, but can, if given free rein, cut down seriously on the amount of good work the family would otherwise be producing.

In your church, do you feel this way about it? If not, why? What are the churches trying to do anyway, if not to lead men to live better lives, and to learn to love their fellowmen? Can you expect to persuade a man with a head on his shoulders that your specific denomination has cornered all or nearly all of the religious thought that is correct? Can you afford, with men and women and boys and girls going astray around you, to stand out and contend that your church is alone right? How, do you imagine, does the "deeply-dyed" sterner feel about the churches as a whole, when there is not that unity of expression and work that there should be?

And just one more question—"What has happened to the Ministerial Conference of Manassas?"

TROMPSON WILL FLED.

Estate of Late Prince William Resident in Excess of \$100,000.

A certified copy of the will of Corbin Thompson, proprietor of Staron dairy, Washington, and resident of this county for many years, who died last month, has been filed in Washington.

The will provides that certain real estate be given to his daughters, Mary V. and Frances J. Thompson, and a nephew, Edward Thompson, and the other household effects to his wife, Mary I. Thompson. The remaining estate is devised to the American Security and Trust Company in trust, to continue the business until a sale is made, but if the nephew, Edward Thompson, desires to purchase, he is to pay only four-fifths of what another would offer.

Until a sale of the business is made, the trustee is directed to pay the widow \$75 per month for her maintenance. The estate is valued to amount of \$100,000.

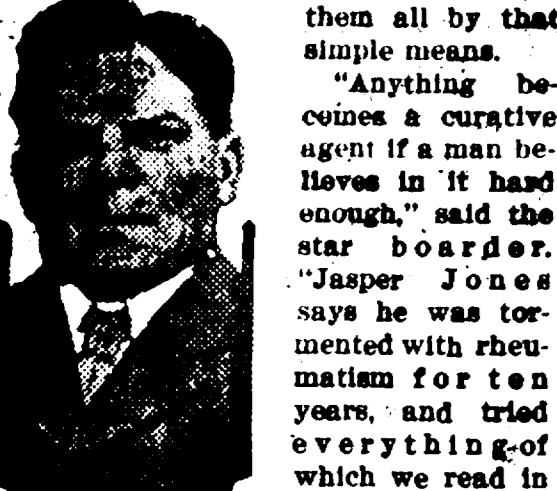
