with the laws of the town, the NEWS will each week publish a portion of the Code of the Town of Manassas, as was brought out in booklet form in 1918. Mention will be made of amendments to the code, where amendments have been made and where the NEWS can obtain definite information covering such amendents.]

CODE OF THE TOWN OF MANASSAS. (Continued from last week.)

Sec. 53. It shall be unlawful for any person to sell or offer for sale any firewood other than by the cord or fraction thereof, or to deliver a less quantity of wood than that actually sold or offered for sale. Also Aesop's Fable. Admission, 11 and Any person violating any of the provisions of this section shall be 22 cents. fined five dollars. Nothing in this section shall be construed as prohibiting the sale of wood by the armful.

Sec. 54. All ice and coal sold or offered for sale shall be by weight, and any person delivering a less quantity than that represented shall be fined five dollars for each offence.

Sec. 55. All railroad tracks and switches crossing the streets of mission, 6 and 11 cents; night, 11 and the town shall be filled up between the rails as near level with the 22 cents. top of the rails as may be done with safety, either with stone or two inch oak boards. Any person, firm or corporation failing to comply with this section within twenty-four hours after being notified by the Sergeant of their default shall be fined fen dollars for each day they shall continue in default.

Sec. 56. The Southern Railway Company is authorized to use locomotive engines and cars on all tracks and switches lying south of sion, 22 and 40 cents. Center street, but no locomotive engine or car shall be run at a greater rate of speed than eight miles an hour. Any person, corporation or receiver violating this section shall be fined ten dollars.

Sec. 57. It shall be unlawful for any corporation, receiver or trustee operating a railroad to obstruct free passage on any street or avenue by standing cars or trains of cars on the same except passenger trains while receiving and discharging passengers. Any corporation, trustee or receiver violating this section shall be fined not less than ten nor more than twenty dollars.

Sec. 58. No steam or electric whistles attached to any locomotive 17 cents. shall be used within the town, except in cases of emergency. Any person violating this section shall be fined ten dollars.

Sec. 59. Any person corporation, trustee or receiver permitting any car or cars to cross a street or avenue when not coupled to a locomotive engine shall be fined twenty dollars. Nothing herein contained shall be construed as prohibiting the moving of a car which is 11 and 22 cents. started without the aid of an engine.

Sec. 60. Whenever a locomotive engine is used to shift cars across the streets or avenues of the town a man shall ride on the front of such engine or car, stationed not exceeding five feet above the road bed. Any person, corporation, trustee or receiver violating this person the M.I. C. BUILDING section shall be fined five dollars.

Sec. 61. All owners or occupiers of lots shall cut and remove greatles of tooth. therefrom (and burning shall be equivalent to semoving), all-weeds or other voluntary growth within five days after being notified so to do by the Board of Health. Any person violating this section shall be fined one dollar for each day they may be in default.

Sec. 62. Any person or persons boarding or alighting from any standing or moving train, within the town of Manassas, not having POOL ROOM. license-or business on said train, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and, upon conviction, thereof, shall be fined not less than one no more than five dollars. Any person, firm or corporation violating this ordinance shall be fined one dollar, and each day such pole is permitted to stand without the required permit having been first obtained, or to stand without the required permit having been first obtained, or after said pole or poles have been ordered moved by the Council shall constitute a separate offence. Sec. 64. Any person riding a bicycle after dark without a light

thereon shall be fined one dollar. Sec. 65. Any person riding a bicycle on the sidewalk shall be fined one dollar.

Sec. 66. It shall be unlawful for any person to make a loafing place of the raliway station, either in or about the buildings, and any person failing or refusing to leave when ordered by the Sergeant or any official of the railway company shall be fined one dollar.

Sec. 67. There shall be appointed annually by the Council a physician and one member of the Council, who, with the Mayor shall constitute a Board of Health for the said town. The Mayor shall be the chairman and the town clerk shall be the clerk of the said Board. Such Board of Health shall have charge of the sanitary affairs of the town, and, shall, subject to the provisions of Chapter 1146, Acts of the General Assembly, 1899-1900, and the Acts amendatory thereof, have control of the prevention and eradication of contagious and infectious diseases, and the removal and quarantine of suspects, upon such terms as may be deemed reasonable, until the next regular meeting of the Council. The Board of Health shall require the Sergeant to cause to be put in a sanitary condition any street, alley or private property found to be in an unsanitary condition. It shall be the dut of the Sergeant to execute such orders of the Board of Health as it shall require him to execute.





WHAT IS TUBERCULOSIS?

DR. LAWRASON BROWN, Satenac Lake, N. Y. PUBERCULORIS is a disease caused by a germ, discovered by Rebert Moch in 1882, which early in its course produces little modules, called tubercles. It is widely distributed throughout the world, and attacks man more severely when he abandons a nomadic or outnoor life and lives in Mrie

geins and the cattle germ. The cattle germ, while rarely affecting, adults. causes annually the death of about 10,000 children and infants in the United States. It is conveyed by milk, and is killed by boiling or pasteuriging the

by the consumptive and deposited only too often on sidewarks and floors. The germ gains entrance into the body by inhaiction of the fine dronlets of sputum coughed out by the consumptive, by the inhalation of dried sputume in the form of dust and by the transference through dirty angers of the particles of sputum in the dirt of the streets and houses, from balls, tons and other playthings, to the mouth.

The younger the child, the more readily he is infected and often he mouths the objects he soils in the dirt in play. By the age of puberty two-thirds to three-quarters of all children have had the germ in their bodies, but only a small percentage of these develop the disease. It is estimated that 2,000,000 persons in the United States have tuberculosis today, and without doubt many contracted it first in childhood. It is not safe, howsumption, for a rather large percentage may owe the disease in their lungs to an infection in later life.

These facts serve to emphasize the importance of good hygienic living and the avoidance of overstrain of any sort, whether work, pleasure or play, When man lives in the open he seldom develops pulmonary tuberculosis, but when he changes this for indoor life he may succumb. The boy and girl whe play and live much out of doors have little tuberculosis until they become thirteen or fourteen years old. It then increases as the anxieties of school the harden of work, and the overindulgence in pleasure make more densands on the body, until it is most frequent between the twentieth and thirdeth year.
