The said Treasurer shall be clothed with all the authority for the collection of taxes, licenses, moneys assessments or dues due and owing to the said town as is now pro vided by law applicable to county treasurers; and he shall be subject to such rules, penalties, and requirements as the Town Counci may from time to time prescribe. The said treasurer before entering upon the duties of his office shall take and subscribe the oath provided by law for all officers of the Commonwealth of Virginia, and shall execute a bond, with approved corporate surety, in the penalty of \$3,000 for the faithful performance of his duties as such.



Perhaps the readers of the NEWS recall having read in the daily papers a short while ago of a despicable form of "sport" that had been taken up by the boys of a Northern state—the hurling of rocks at passing automobiles, resulting in the frequent damaging of the motor cars and the occasional injury of the occupants. When reading of this, little did the editor dream of finding such uncivilized conduct in Prince William on the Sunday just past. Oh, yes, boys will be boys, and boys will play their pracks, and we wouldn't give a rap for a boy who did not have plenty of energy, but it's one thing to have fun and an entirely different thing to subject the property and bodily welfare of peaceful citizens to such vandalism as was evidenced right here in Prince William Sunday.

Three boys, on a public, but unimproved highway in upper Prince William, upon seeing a motor car approach, hastily began gathering rocks. As the car passed they stood in battle array, and but for a quickening of speed on the part of the driver, one or more of the occupants of the car might have suffered serious injury from the flying rocks.

Here is something that can be taken as a subject for a study period in every school, especially in the little one-room schools, where the hove are not always as prone as they should be to recognize that the whole structure of our civilization rests upon the respect accorded the rights and property of others.

ALL VERGINIA DEPLORES THE ORANGE INCIDENT.

Orange did not enjoy its usual peaceful Sunday on the 23d. Af ter Sheriff W. C. Bond, of Orange county, and Julian Boyer, sergeant of Orange, failed to return from a moonshine raid, on stilk that had been reported in operation near the town of Orange, a search instituted for them found that they had been killed by shot guns. A posse immediately took up the hunt of the two negroes whom it is, alleged shot the officers. After a lengthy battle, in which four members of the posse were wounded, the negroes were burned to death in the barn from which they refused to surrender themselves.

In the final analysis, who is responsible for the death of these two officers, the burning of the two negroes, the injury of four other citizens of Orange, and the adding of another blot upon the record of the Old Dominion? Don't put the blame on the makers of the moonshine liquor and the bootleggers who passed it out. These, of course. were violating the law, but how about those who created the market?

In every section of the country today, living under the guise of a law-abiding citizenship, there are many MEN and BOYS who are encouraging, via the cash payment route, the illicit liquor traffic. A man does not have to be a pessimist to affirm that the situation is not improving; if anything it is growing worse. And as long as socalled respectable citizens wink at the prohibition law, and, pampering their selfish appetites, buy the booze, we are going to find occasional repetitions of the deplorable Orange incident and many minor occurrences of somewhat the same character, due to a lack of respect for a duly legalized law of the land.




