with the laws of the town, the NEWS will each week publish a portion of the Code of the Town of Manassas, as was brought out in booklet form in 1918. Mention will be made of amendments to the code. where amendments have been made and where the NEWS can obtain definite information covering such amendments.]

CODE OF THE TOWN OF MANASSAS.

Sec. 109. No person shall cause to be sunk or shall use any valut or well as a receptacle or a privy or water closet. Any person viola- miss it. Admission 17e and 25c. ting this section shall be fined not less than one, nor more than ten

Sec. 140. Any person violating any ordinance for which no penalty is prescribed shall be fined not less than one, nor more than ten

Sec. 111. Any person committed to fail for the non-payment any fine imposed by the Mayor or other lawful authority may be required to work on the streets, as provided by an ordinance passed on the fourth day of October, 1901.

The following milk ordinance was adopted at a regular meeting of the Council on September 26, 1921, and takes the place of Second 76 of the Code:

Be it ordained by the Council of the Town of Manassas, Virginia: 1. That no person, firm or corporation shall sell, exchange or deliver, or offer to sell, exchange or deliver, or have in his custody for

the purpose of offering for sale, exchange or delivery, any milk unless and until he has obtained a permit therefor from the Board of Health. 2. Such permit shall be issued, and, when issued, shall be and 22 cents. remain valid only upon condition that the holder thereof shall at all times hold his cows, dairy herd, stables, dairy, and all receptacles and milk containers and his method and means of delivering milk to his customers open to the inspection of the Board of Health of the

6. Persons selling or offering milk for sale within the limits of the town shall comply with the following further provisions:

(a) That the milking be done in a clean and sanitary manner. (b) That the milk be cooled immediately after milking to 60 de

(c) That the milk delivered in clean, scalded bottles or othe

containers having closely fitting tops. 7. Every such permit shall be revoked by the failure of the holder thereof to comply in every respect with the provisions of this ordi nance, and in addition to having such permit revoked any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordance shall, upon conviction, be subject to a fine of not less than twenty dollars nor more than one hundred dollars for each offence. Section 76 of the Code of the town of Manassas is hereby repealed.

AUTOMOBILES

Sec. 94. No person shall drive or propel or cause to be driven or propelled any automobile, horseless or motor vehicle, or bicycle upon any street, avenue, alley or public highway, within the town of Manassas, at a greater speed than twelve miles an hour, between intersecting streets, avenues or alleys nor across the street, at a greater speed than eight miles per hour, nor around the corner of any street, avenue or alley, at a greater speed than six miles per hour.

2. Each vehicle to which these regulations refer shall be equipped with at least two suitable lamps, in conformity with the requirements of State law, such lamps to be carried at the front of the vehicle on each side. There shall also be a lamp attached to the left side of the rear of such vehicle, so as to throw a bright light upon, and thus make plainly visible the machine number, and to show a red light to the rear. The said lamps shall be kept brightly burning from one-half hour after sunset as long as the vehicle is used at night, provided that the provisions of this section requiring the placing of the lamp upon the rear of the vehicle shall not apply to motor cycles.







WHY FRESH AIR IS GOOD MEDICINE

VERYONE knows that fresh air is one of the best medicines and incidentally one of the cheapest. More and more doctors are prescribing "the fresh air cure" for all sorts of diseases. Yet not all people know fresh air when they see it or realize to what it owes its tonic qualities. Here are the principal signs by which you may know "fresh air." (1) Fresh air is cool air. Air that is above 68° F is always harmful

except for very old people. Whenever the indoor temperature rises above this point the circulation is upset, one tends to become duli, languid, and inefficient, and the delicate membranes of the nose and throat are injured so as to cause a great liability to colds and other respiratory diseases. (2) Fresh air is moving air. Still air blankets the body and produces a deadening, numbing effect. Air in gentle motion stimulates the skin. (8) Fresh air is moderately moist air. Bither very dry or very humid

(4) Fresh air is variable air. Slight changes in temperature and humidity are stimulating and wholesome for the body. These four qualities are always found to the best advantage out of doors and it is for this reason that sleeping, working and living in the open is one of the best ways of keeping the body fit, vigorous and efficient.

When you must be indoors, don't forget your good friend, the thermometer, The best thing that ever happened for the health of the children of New York was a regulation requiring the placing of a thermometer on the front of every teacher's desk, with a heavy red line opposite 68 degrees, thermometer of this kind in every living room and work place, with somebody watching it to turn of heat or epen windows as soon as the temperature passes 68 degrees, would cut in helf the number of colds and other nose and threat diseases from which Americans suffer as a result of everheating.



In 1806, at the request of the population, Hawaii was an-nexed to the United States. Porte Rice, Guam and the Phillegines were coded to the United States in 1800 as a result of the Spanish-American war. Perte Rice and the Philippines are dependencies and not territories. Their local affairs are administered by a legislature of two in the United States by resident commissioners elected by the leg-islatures. Guam is under the
