## MANASSAS

### One of the Most Historical Towns in Northern Virginia

Manassas not only is a beautiful and delightful town in which to live; a town abounding in historical interest, well governed and well kept, but is a most active and progressive business community.

In the early life of Virginia its importance was not great but with the completion of inland railroad systems it began to grow in value to the section, as a shipping point and the fact that it is the county seat added to its influence.

Today though old in years Manassas is young in its development possibilities and virile in its business activities. The experience gained through many years of honorable commercial enterprise has conservatively tempered Manassas' business perception, enabling it to discriminate between the legitimate, substantial business ventures, which constitute the real view of a successful community, as against the questionable character of a questionable character or doubtful success.

Manassas' community population which would include, of course, the settlements and residences immediately bordering its boundaries, is approximately 3,000. Only a few years ago it was less than three-fourths that number and today many homes are in the course of construction. Practically all the business property in town is occupied by thriving concerns and real estate is selling at higher figures than ever before. Not only is it selling but it is in demand.

Manassas is located on the main line of the Southern Railway and is the junction point of the Manassas-Harrisonburg branch of the Southern Railway. It has excellent municipal water, sewerage, electric power and lights, concrete sidewalks, modern brick buildings in business district. The town is splendidly laid off. Here are two banks, a high grade hotel, a large flour mill, paving block factory, retail business establishments, ice plant, Eastern College-Conservatory for Girls; splendid graded and high school; Eighth Congressional District Agricultural School; eight churches, many beautiful homes, fine healthful climate. A few miles out from the town are the celebrated battlefields of the First and Second Manassas, of Civil War fame. A movement, which bids fair to be a complete success, is underway whereby the principal portions of the battlefields will be developed into a magnificent Confederate memorial park.

Prince William, one of the old historical counties of the State, is devoted principally to agriculture. It has a population of about 14,000; possessed of but few foreigners; only 20 per cent of the total population being negroes, and these of the most desirable type. Prince William is growing healthily and steadily; yearly it is drawing westerners and progressive farmers from many other sections of the country. It has a live-wire demonstration agent, a fine county home demonstration agent, about a score of community leagues, several community fairs and a county annual fair. It is getting its roads in better and better shape each year.

One Of the Most Able Business Men in Northern Virginia.

## NEED OF FACTORIES HERE

### Prince William County Rich in Mineral Resources and Raw Material

The essential need for the rapid industrial development of Manassas, without doubt, is manufacturing. Without these there can be no steady employment for labor, skilled or unskilled, in large numbers, and the city cannot advance at the rate justified by its geographical location, shipping facilities and natural assets.

The question now before the industries should be the town attempt to attract and how should it go about getting them. In considering this the business men of this town should immediately eliminate any dream of locating here a super-manufacturing plant that would employ thousands of persons.

A start in the right direction is the important thing, no matter how small it maybe, provided it is the beginning of a comprehensive program of up-building, a long lines that can be sustained by the natural resources and assets of the community.

What is needed here and will be most successful in industrial advancement are plants that will use raw materials at hand for the manufacture of products that can be disposed of in nearby markets. Such plants not only will employ local labor, but will put money in the hands of those in the section who supply the raw material.

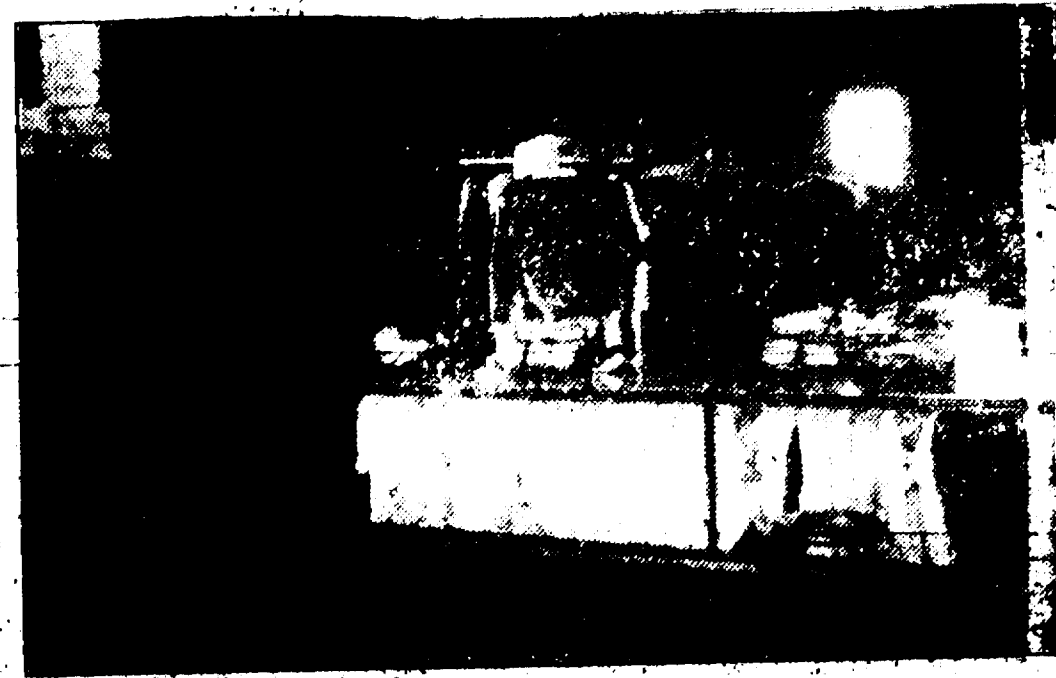

It is not "one crop" section but is adapted to the most diversified agricultural pursuits, from truck farming to dairying and within it can be raised most of the important commercial fruits to be found in the temperate zone. Some of the largest, best and most famous Jersey, Guernsey and Ayrshire dairy herds in Virginia are to be found in this section. It is also the source of a large number of every fine beef cattle herds, such as Black Angus, Short Horns and other well known breeds.

It is especially suited to cattle raising and dairying as the grass, clover, red top clover and other fine grasses grow in abundance, supplying the best kind of feed for fattening and increasing milk supply.

The section is equally as rich in horticultural assets, as in the home of many splendid orchards where the best varieties of apples are grown in abundance for commercial purpose.

Corn, wheat, oats, rye and other grains can be grown to advantage and are the mainstays of many farmers, who find a ready market for their products at the mill in Manassas, or in the railroad towns and stations in this general section.

With these facts in mind the town can make no more intelligent effort than an organized and sustained move towards the development and up-building of the rural community.

It does not matter if at first the effort seems to be directed away from Manassas instead of towards it, or that it yields no immediate profits. It will pay handsomely in the long run and will be the means of creating a bigger, better and more progressive Manassas, for when the rural community prospers and increases in population, the town will prosper and increase in population.

The town's larger effort is to be directed towards industrial expansion solely, it must expect to deplete the farms of man power and finally ruin this great asset, but if its efforts are directed towards developing the farming community first, an overplus of labor will soon accumulate which will entice labor employers here to consume it.

Agricultural advancement is normal, healthy and safe, industrial advancement often is dangerous and always is so when it attracts labor from the farm.

It would seem, then, that the business men of Manassas should look into the matter of farming needs from a city standpoint, not what is needed on the farm—the farmer knows that better than anyone else—but what is needed in the city for the encouragement and development of farm life.

This should be community effort.
