Lee: Monticello, home of Thomas Jefferson; Jamestown Island, site of the first English settlement in America; Williamsburg, first permanent seat of English government in the United States; the State Capitols of Delabirthplace of Woodrow Wilson at Staunton; and the home of James Madison at Grange; Carroll Manor, Maryland; Blackistone Island, Maryland, where settlers first landed in 1634 and historic St. Marys City, which they founded; Lewes, Delaware, site of the first landing of settlers in that state; Mt. Calvert county seat of Prince George's County, Maryland, which was founded in 1695; the University of Virginia; and Natural Bridge, one of America's natural beauty spots. Leather in the seat of the chair was made from the hide of a pedigreed Maryland bull dressed and tanned in Washington County, Maryland.
