Historical significance (Chain of title: individuals, families, events, etc., associated with the property.)

The Bridwell-Holmes and Bridwell cemeteries are located in the "Montezuma Section," Area
15A, on the U. S. Marine Corps Base. The Bridwell-Holmes Cemetery is on the west side of
Johns Branch, about 1,000 feet south of the "Concrete Road," and about 3/4 mile west of the
formerly-existing commercial crossroads known as Fayman. The cemetery was larger before
1942, when some graves were removed and reinterred in Cedar Run Cemetery, q.v., when this land
was acquired by the Federal government in 1942. Those burials remaining were not moved because
the Marine Corps could not find the descendants and/or could not obtain permission for removal
of the graves.


There are four marked graves, the earliest of which is that of Mary H. Holmes (1817-1906). There are also plots for Randy Suthard, Grover Cleveland Groves, and possibly also a Herndon. Approximately 35 pieces of cinder block mark the graves that were moved to Cedar Run Cemetery.
