Buckhall Store is a two-story, frame, weatherboarded structure measuring about 22' x 30' and having several one-story shed-roofed additions. A simple I-type building, it has plain box trim around its 6/6 sliding sash windows. There is a box cornice with a wide plain frieze, gable returns, and cornerboards. These architectural features are visible only at the second floor level of the front and west sides because of the several additions. There is a 1½-story addition on the rear, covered with weatherboards and probably dating to the early 20th century. The second floor contains an apartment or office.

Interior inspected?

Historical significance (Chain of title; individuals, families, events, etc., associated with the property.)

The store was reportedly built by a Mr. Evans, possibly J.R. Evans. The present owner inherited the store from her father, William Davis, who had purchased the property in 1932 from a man named Smith. Mrs. Kemper and her first husband, the late Charles Cornwell, operated the store at Buckhall until several years ago. During the Davis ownership, the old school building beside the store was used as a feed store and for storage.

There was a post office in Buckhall from 1885 to 1915, and, according to the present owner, the post office was in this store.

The store is presently owned by Mr. and Mrs. Thomas J. De Lavello, who have operated the store since 1977. Because of the great variety of goods for sale, the store has received the nickname "Buckhall Mall."

In addition to the general store, this historical community contains the former Buckhall School, located beside the store and presently being used as a civic center; several older houses, including the white house, known as the William Davis House (76-225); and the Buckhall Church and Buckhall Cemetery (76-233).








