### Buckland Hall -- ownership history.

Pre-1787 Samuel Love acq. large ~~grant~~ tract of land in P.W. lying south of south branch of Broad Run & extending from below Kinsley Mill to above what is now the town of Buckland.

Samuel Love died 1787, leaving Buckland Hall to his son John. John passed it to Temple Washington in 1822 +  
In 1853 Major Richard Bland Lee a nephew of Light horse Harry Lee, acquired it. In 1875 Buckl Hall passed to another Bland Lee.

K. MILL

in 1794 Chas + John Love (brother) applied for water rights on Broad Run and proceeded to erect Kinsley mill & a granary nearby, with the mill's ~~res.~~ res. above. An elevated wooden bridge connected the dwelling with the mill.

John Love also built wooden mill upstream and due west of where he later laid out town of Buckland.
