# City may take man to court

Historic mill center of property battle

Manassas city officials thought they were giving Brian Mannix an offer he couldn't refuse. But he did refuse it and now officials may find themselves in court. Soon.

Officials offered the Prince William County resident almost \$30,000 for use of an acre of his property, which may be flooded as the level of Lake Manassas rises.

But Mannix demanded \$125,000 for use of the land, which includes what he claims is one of the last historic mills in the county, according to Bendall.

"I cannot in clear conscious approach the City Council and ask them to pay five times the value of the appraised value of the land," Bendall said. "Now we need a court to tell us what the value is."

A letter from the city arrived at Mannix' house last week giving him 10 days to accept a final offer from the city for the land. On Friday that grace period will be over and city officials say they will try to secure the easement.

member of the Society of Preservation of Old Mills, said he's holding his ground to protect his piece of history.

"This would give them permission to store water and cause flooding on our proper-ty," he said. "It puts the lake inside an old mill that I own. And it may be the last standing mill in Prince William County."

Bendall said if Mannix does not accept the city's offer to allow flood easements on his property by the end of the day Friday, he will come to the Manassas City Council with a resolution to bring the matter to Circuit Court.

Mannix has lived in the historic town of Buckland for 13 years with his wife and two children.

The rare remains of the mill, which Mannix is working to restore, sit on the property near the boundary of the proposed easement.

He wants to protect the mill from Lake Manassas' rising waters. The water level of the lake, which supplies the drinking water for Manassas and Manassas Park residents and portions of the county, rose about five feet earlier this year when the city installed a bladder at the top of the dam.

City officials started approaching the residents living along Buckland Mill Road in April 1997 with plans of the flood easements and monetary offers for their troubles.

Bendall said the city has made offers ranging between \$50,000 and promises of septic tank installations on some properties. The total amount of compensation has been about \$150,000, Bendall said. All of the property owners have complied with the city's request except for Mannix and one other property owner.

"This is taking extremely long," Bendall said.
