Maryland Family Buys Famed Buckland House

BUCKLAND - A Blandensburg, Md. antique dealer bought historic Buckland Tavern for \$41,150 at a public auction held at the site Monday. The property, said to have been the site of an 1825 celebration for General the Marquis de Lafayette, had a market value of \$25,400, according to county records.

Thomas J. Ashe Jr., who outlasted five other bidders, including the Prince William County Historical Commission, said he will restore Buckland Tavern "if plans work out" and "might open an antique shop" if it is agreeable to the neighbors.

Ashe said he had only learned of the sale Sunday and had hoped he would not have to pay more than about \$30,000 for it. "I wouldn't have gone up so much if my daughter hadn't egged me on," he said.

Brentsville Supervisor Ralph A. Mauller said Ashe told him he may have difficulty coming up with the money. If so, Mauller said the buyer has agreed to consider negotiating with the county to purchase the structure. The county dropped out of the bidding at \$32,500, the top bid authorized by the board of supervisors, but Mauller seemed confident that the county could solicit donations to meet the bid price.

The auction was conducted under order of the Prince William Circuit Court to meet the mounting medical expenses of Buckland Tavern's owner, Mrs. Grace F. Bear, who has been confined to Manassas Manor nursing home since 1970.

Thomas O. Beane, the court-appointed guardian for Mrs. Bear who is no longer able to handle her own affairs, said he was pleased with the sale which drew over 100 (Continued on Page 3A)
