Previous owners added a 2-story addition to the back, thus enclosing the 2-story kitchen el. This addition contains a recreation room or family room downstairs and a bedroom above. Previous owners also converted into a bathroom a small bedroom over the kitchen.

There allegedly was a corn mill to the left of the left of the house which was demolished at least in 1940, along with the original Catharpin School Building which had been moved twice and was then being used as a storeroom for the mill.

There was a barn, c1900, behind the house.

Historical significance (Chain of title; individuals, families, events, etc., associated with the property.)

Mr. & Mrs. Eicher purchased this house in 1973 from Mr. & Mrs. Jack Cross, who had bought the house in about 1969 from Robert Alvey. Alvey had purchased the house and 5 acres from John Norman, who had bought the 100-acre farm and sold it in small residential lots.

This area was included in Robert "King" Carter's 41,660-acre Bull Run Tract, patented in 1724 in the names of his two sons and five grandsons. A son, George Carter, received the 6,000-acre tract that included what is now Catharpin.
