Mr Francis Ross's bond, paid by Col Wm Berkeley January 1st, 1795

" I promise to pay or cause to be paid, to Robert Spratt of Urbanna, or to his assigns, the just sum of eight pounds, seven shillings, on demand for value received of him, To which payment well and truly to be made. I do bind myself, my heirs, executors and administrators, in the penal sum of fifteen pounds, fourteen shillings, In witness whereof I have herunto set my hand and seal this twenty-fifth day of May, 1795.
Francis Ross."

The following paper was much torn or had been shewed by mice, so that the first few sentences it is impossible to make out.

"----- remember that arms are now required for use, and that they cannot be made so effectual for the defense of our country in any way as in the hand of organized troops. They are needed to enable our cavalry to cope with the well trained and equipped cavalry of the enemy, not only in general service, but in resisting those predatory expeditions which have inflicted so much loss on the people of the interior.

" To the patriotic I need make no other appeal than the wants of the service but I beg to remind those who are reluctant to part with the arms and equipments in their possession, that by keeping them they diminish the ability of the army to defend their property, without themselves deriving any benefit from them.

" I therefore urge all persons, not in the service, to deliver promptly to some of the Officers designated below, such arms and equipments (as especially those suitable for cavalry) which they may have, and to report to those officers the names of such persons as neglect to surrender those in their possession.

Every citizen who prevents a carbine or pistol from remaining unused will render a service to his country. Those who think to retain arms for their own use or defence should remember that if the army cannot protect them, the arms would be of little use.

" While no valid title can be acquired to public arms or equipment, except from the Government, it is reported that many persons have ignorantly purchased them from private persons.

" A fair compensation will therefore be made to all who deliver such arms and equipments to any Ordnance officer, officer commanding a post, officers and agents of the Quartermaster and Commissary Departments, at any stations, or officers in the enrolling service, or connected with the Nitre and Mining Bureau. All these officers are requested, and those connected with this army are directed to receive and receipt for all arms and equipments, whatever their condition, and forward the same with a duplicate copy of receipt to the Ordnance Bureau at Richmond and report their proceedings to these Headquarters.

" The person holding the receipt will be compensated upon presenting it to the Ordnance bureau, while it is hoped that none will disregard this appeal, all officers connected with this army are required and all others are requested to take possession of any public arms and equipment they may
