

EVERGREEN FARM

Once a portion of King Carter's Bull Run Tract, Evergreen descended through the tidewater Virginia families of the Burwells and Berkeleys. Lewis Berkeley built the main portion of the house in 1827 and members of the Berkeley family occupied the property for over 100 years. Evergreen is now the home of Mr. and Mrs. Henry N. Woolman, Jr.

Situated at the foot of the Bull Run Mountains, the property is accessible by both Route 600 and Route 630 and is but a short distance off Route 15. Evergreen is approximately five miles from Haymarket and thirteen and one-half miles from Manassas. Warrenton, Middleburg and The Plains are nearby. With the completion of Interstate Route 66, Washington, D. C. will be little more than a half hour's drive.

The manor house was extensively modernized and the wings were added in 1940 by Thomas DeLashmutt. There are three floors, plus basement, containing more than 8,000 square feet. High ceilings, beautiful woodwork and spacious-sized rooms found only in fine old properties are but a few features of this gracious home. Other improvements consist of the stone and frame stables (with living quarters above), miscellaneous frame barns and sheds, and two dwellings. One dwelling has seven rooms and two baths and the other eight rooms and two baths. A small cabin on Quarters Lane (the mile long road in front of the house) is the last slave house of an original group of 15 that lined this road.

Evergreen has approximately 600 acres of land, of which nearly 400 acres are cleared and the balance is in woodland. The property is well-watered by the headwaters of Chestnut Lick, which pass through the property, as well as by a pond and lake. Long road frontage, on both sides of Route 600 and Route 630, enhances the property. The terrain is gently rolling, well-drained, and the fact that Evergreen has always been known as a productive farm speaks well of its soil's fertility.

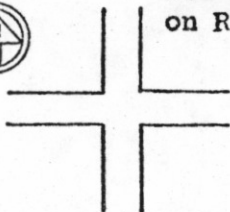
Evergreen is truly one of Northern Virginia's finest estates and well deserves its listing and photograph in the recently published Northern Virginia Heritage.
