I give and bequeath my estate and property, real and personal as follows that is to say

I order first that my just debts shall be paid with convenient speed.

I give and bequeath to my beloved wife B. Johnson and her heirs my estate and interest in certain land in Prince and in consideration of this bequest I request of God to resign and give to his Sister Ann B. Johnson and to his Brother George W. Johnson his father B. Johnson's interest in his father's land's estate.

I also will bequeath to my child Sarah Johnson and her heirs one hundred Acres of my land known as the Muddy place, and now occupied by Richard Peter, and in consideration of this bequest I request her to resign and give to her Sister Ann B. Johnson and to her Brother George W. Johnson her father B. Johnson's interest in his father's land's estate.

I give and bequeath to my beloved Joseph Beckner the remainder of my land known as the Muddy place supposed to be fifty five Acres to be taken off the South part of the land.

I give and bequeath to my child Mary Beckman and her heirs my land known as the Two Hundred Acres of land to be laid off as follows. Beginning at my corner a fence in Lodgey's great field as the said fence running easterly with my line and Charles Beckman's line known as the first fence to a point between the first and second Cherry trees on the line of fence east of my gate. Thence Northwesterly a straight line passing between the two turn-out houses to the line of Charles Beckman's line. Thence with the line of Charles Beckman's line Northwesterly to a box oak thence Southwesterly to the beginning to make the Two Hundred Acres.

I give and bequeath to my beloved Mary Ann Beckman and her heirs all of my land lying between the easterly line of my fence to the line of Beckman's and the

I give and bequeath to my friend Sarah Johnson and her heirs one hundred acres of my land known as the Muddy place, and more described by Richard Sayer, and in consideration of this bequest I require her to relinquish and give to her Sister Annid Johnson and to her brother George Johnson her Lacie Johnson's interest in her father's land's estate.

I give and bequeath to my friend Joseph Cookman the remainder of my farm known as the Muddy place supposed to be fifty five acres to be taken off the South part of the farm.

I give and bequeath to my friend Mary Deacon and her heirs my Corner lot Two hundred Acres of land to be laid off as follows. Beginning at my Corner a Stone in College Green at Boston as the South end running easterly with my line and Charles Burnetts line known as the first line to a point between the first and second Corner trees on the line of land east of my gate. thence Northwesterly a straight line passing between the two Corner houses to the line of Charles Burnetts line thence with the line of Charles Burnetts Northwesterly to a log Oak thence Southwesterly to the beginning to make the Two hundred Acres.

I give and bequeath to my friend Rufus Cookman and his heirs one of my land lying between the easterly line of my bequest to Mary Deacon and the lands of Mr. Deakin and Charles Burnetts line, reserving in this bequest the Corner house lately occupied by James Grier and two Acres of land adjoining the said house to be for the use and occupation of my former servant Rufus Cookman during his life, and at his death the house and two Acres of land shall be the property of Rufus Cookman and his heirs.

I give and bequest to my former servant Asst. King and her heirs Eighteen Acres of land to be laid off as follows. Beginning at a Stone in West Branch, my Northwest Corner and running up West Branch to my Corner near Carters road thence Southwesterly with my line and Carters road thence easterly to the west end and

I give and bequeath to my former servant Ruth Mitchell fifty
dollars of some time some off as follows. One of my four lying
between the No. 2000th Road and the Chesapeake Bay Rail Road and
corner of the South-west Corner of my land bounded by fences
near the east of the Chesapeake Bay Rail Road the being
a part of the land purchased by me from the heirs of
Elizabeth Thumant to make Fifty Acres.

I order and direct that the remainder of my real estate
and all of my personal property be sold and the proceeds
being and the sale of the same be and are hereby directed
to be equally divided between the heirs of my sister
