
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

SUBJECT:

Colvin Place, or "Hazelwood".

LOCATION:

About 1 mile southeast of Nokesville, Virginia, on Route #68 thence about 2.5 miles south west on Route #645, thence west a mile on Route #606, south side of road.

1770.

OWNERS:

William Foote. Sanford Howison. George Colvin. Colvin family, present owners.

DESCRIPTION:

The Colvin Place, or "Hazelwood" as it was once known, is built on an elevation which commands a fine view of the countryside. It was once surrounded by large trees , but time and storms have done their worst, and there are few left today. However the huge stumps left testiny their s The plan is unusual, as it has had additions at various t Formerly the two back rooms and large pantry were connect with the other part of the house by a porch, but this bei very inconvenient, as well as cold in the winter, a conne ing room was added. These rooms are evidently the oldest part of the house, and the chimney at this end is very in esting. It measures nineteen feet at the base, and is bot shape, has a window in the center and is very well built, are the other chimneys. This chimney is the outstanding feature of the house.

The large outside kitchen is still standing, and in good condition. This too has a large fireplace. The peaked r smoke house is still standing, but the numerous outbuildi and cabins which were a part of the plantation have been for years.

The interior of the house is highly interesting. The hal and drawing room have some very fine hand carving. is especially lovely, with its fluted columns, sunburst i the panels, all most exquisitely executed. There is a hi wainscoting, and altogether it is a stately and imposing The hall is large and enriched by the same fine hand work characterizes the drawing room.

The beautiful double door has a night bar still in use af

one hundred and fifty years. There is a fan-shaped trans over the door, and the casings have the same fluted panel ing which distinguishes the mantel in the drawing room. staircasing is elaborately carved in wall of Troy design, The general plan of the house is difficult to describe as has no definite pattern. One goes up a few steps to this room, and down a few steps to the next. There are narrow halls and passageways, and closets where least expected. The inner window in the hall on the third floor that was made to give light to the stairway, is unusual. There were fireplaces in every room, but many of them hav been closed and stoves substituted. However some very ni ones remain on the second and third floors. The two old rooms in the rear of the house, now used as dining room and kitchen are panelled, or rather sheathed entirely in wide boards of heart pine. There is an enclos stairway which leads from the dining room to the room abo The chimney closet is very large, extending far back alon the wall, and has as much storage space as is found in re store rooms on most plantations.

6. HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE:

Kettle Run Creek is about one fourth of a mile distant fr the house, and formerly a road ran parallel with the Cree The house faced on this road. Now there is nothing left show that a road ever existed except here and there a bit of the bed which is overgrown with trees, and a few falli aby ments where a bridge crossed the stream. The house faces the garden today, and the road by which it is approis not much travelled. The old house is not known to the casual passer-by.

During the War Between the States, "Hazelwood" had its spacious drawing room used as headquarters by officers of

the Union Army.

Despite time, and the raveges of war, there are many bits of the old garden left, plants that are rarely found too rose", which is not a rose at all, but belongs to the convolvulus family. These flowers have been growning on the place for generations. Many now rare shruts and pla found here are cions of those planted by the Foote family in Prince William County, Virginia.

The interior of "Hazelwood" holds many treasures for the lovers of antiques. There are some fine old pieces of c and glass, including several bits of lovely Wedgewood. are interesting pieces of furniture, including desks, ch four-poster beds, in fact a regular store house of treas

In the store room on the third floor are to be found old saddle-bags, canteens, muskets, old sabres, and various souvenirs of war. Hanks of flax, grown and spun on the tobacco, likewise grown there, and has been there for thirty

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were a part of every housewife's lore, and many other quaint relics of by gone days are salvaged here.

The land on which this house was built was a part of the original Foote plantation. The Foote plantation was a part of the old Brent tract which was proposed as a Town but was never more than a paper town. It was owned and occupied by the Howison family, but came to them through inheritance.
