Cemetery, located along the unimproved road leading to the demolished Missouri Mill, consists of about 15 graves (13 marked, 2 unmarked) enclosed by a 4-foot high, rectangular, brick wall built by the U.S. Marines and reached by a turnstyle opening in the north wall.

Cemetery is still in use, but no new burials allowed without U.S.M.C. permission.

Interior inspected?

Historical significance (Chain of title; individuals, families, events, etc., associated with the property.)

The grave of Thomas Chapman (1769-1827) is the earliest burial in this cemetery. Chapman operated the Missouri Mills, a gristmill and sawmill, located a few hundred yards southwest of this cemetery. Other burials here were members of the Able, Cato, Haley, and Leary familie Learys also operated the mill, but the Purcells, who owned it in 1900, were probably the last operators of the mill.

The miller's house was located either about 100 yards west of the Leary Cemetery (according to R. Leu), or on a hill just northeast of the cemetery (E. R. CONNER from JOHN LEARY). When Leu visited the site in 1972, he found stone chimneys and foundations in the former location, which he believed were the miller's house foundations; but E. R. Conner, who visited the site with John Leary, a descendant of the miller, indicated that the latter site on a hill northeast of the cemetery was the location of the miller's house, and that the ruins of the house had been cleared by the U.S. Marines.


