# 4 Homes, 1 Boat Open for Benefit

This Saturday and Sunday, April 28 and 29, area residents will have an opportunity to see how other people live by going through four homes and a house boat that will be open for public inspection in Occoquan.

The homes and boat will be open from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Saturday and from 1 to 5 p.m. on Sunday to benefit the Prince William Symphony Orchestra Guild. The house tour is the guild's annual major fund raising project in behalf of the symphony orchestra.

Included on the tour are these locations from which you can purchase tickets at \$7 each to include all five:

•The home of the Michael Mooneys at 304 Commerce Street. This is the oldest home on this weekend's tour and is shown on an 1804 map. The house still has its original siding, windwos and tin roof.

•The Grover J. Manderfield residence at 1098 Swan Point Road, overlooking the Occoquan River and adjacent to Interstate 95 but reachable from Gordon Blvd. This is a spacious

contemporary home that was designed with children in mind.

•Anchorage, originally built for the Wilson Fishers and now owned by Ret. Lt. Coil. and Mrs. John Williams. This residence at 1100 Swan Point Road features 15 rooms on multilevels overlooking the river and a stone terrace interspersed with tiles which formerly graced the deck of Adolph Hilter's yacht.

•The Fred Parsels residence, a new three-level home at 113 Poplar Lane that has an uncluttered view of the river.

•Aquahome, a 46-foot, \$150,000 Criscraft, a luxury fiberglass boat that is on view at Hoffmaster's Marinas at 1214 Swan Point Road.
