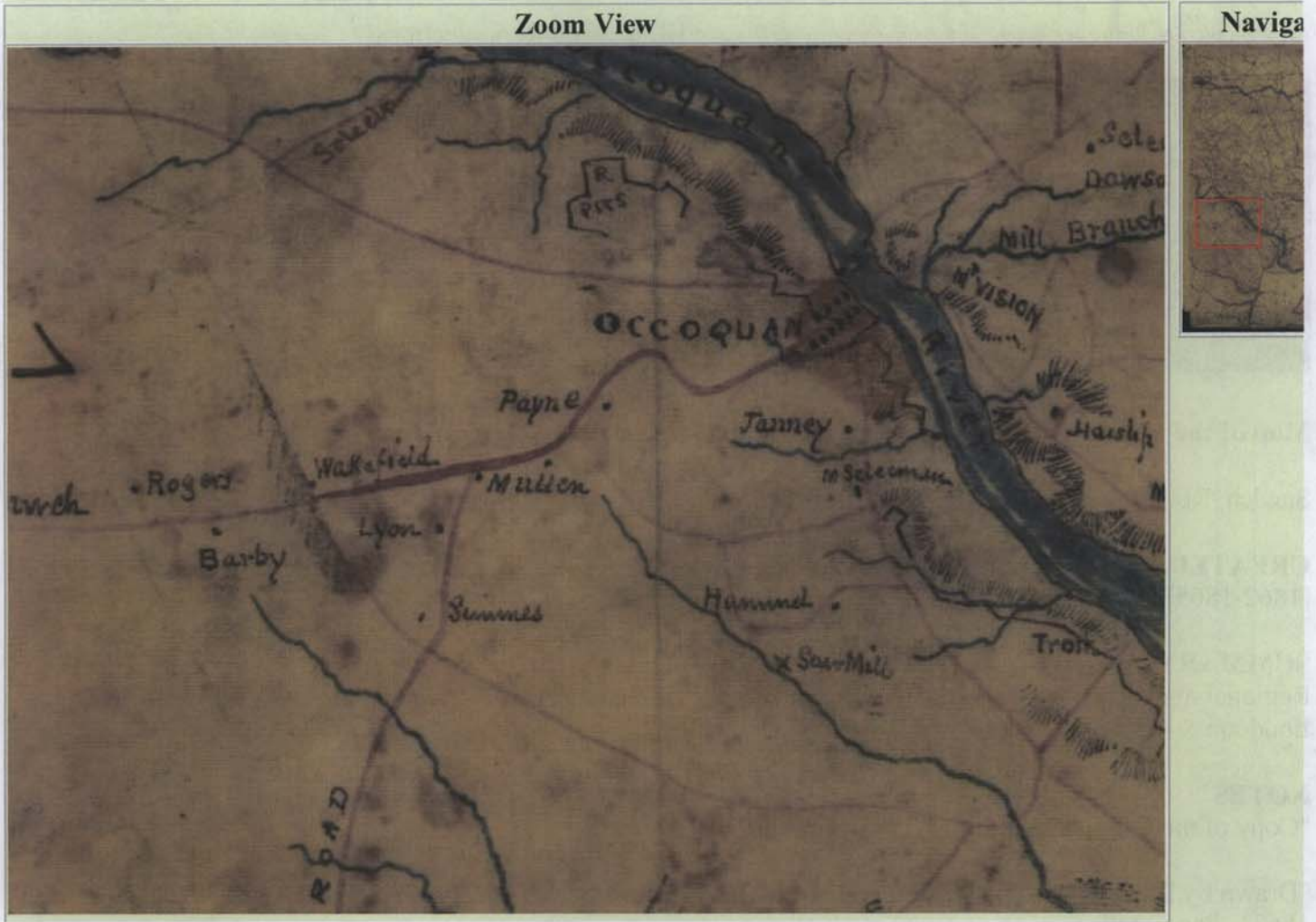


Map of the Potomac River, Va. : from Alexandria to below the Occoquan.

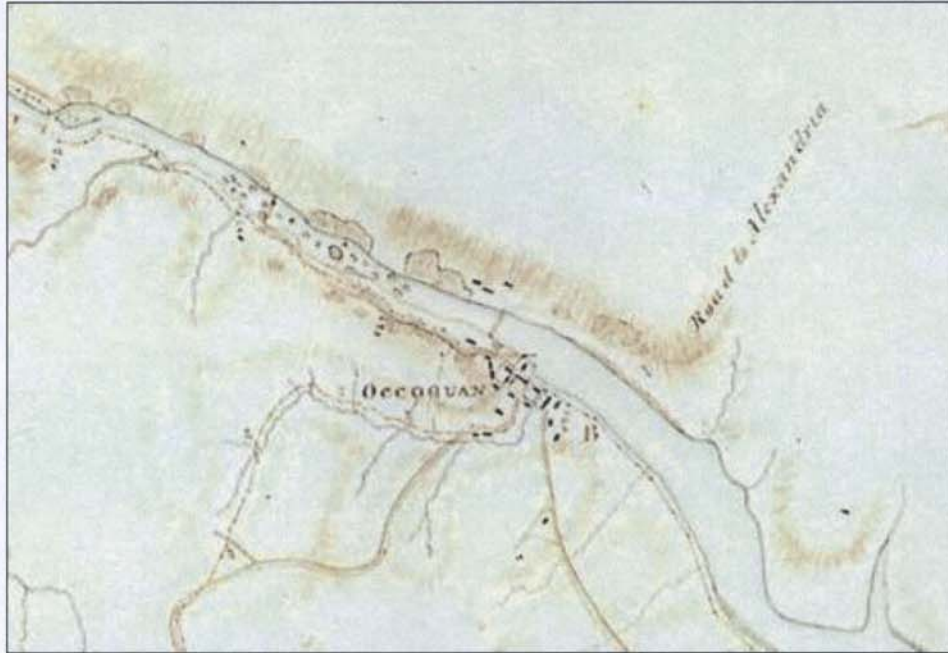

DID YOU KNOW?

John Spence, born in Scotland, in 1766; was educated at the University of Edinburgh, but owing to ill health, could not stay to graduate. He came to this country in 1788, settling in Dumfries, Virginia, as a private tutor. Later he engaged in the practice of medicine. He was active in introducing vaccination into the United States. The University of Pennsylvania gave him the degree of Doctor of Medicine in 1828. His correspondence with Dr. Benjamin Rush was published in the "Medical Museum of Philadelphia." He also contributed to the "Medical Respository" and the "American Journal of the Medical Sciences," and left several manuscripts on medical subjects. He died in Dumfries, Virginia, May 18, 1829.¹
