This is a small family cemetery on the east side of Dale Boulevard extended and located between the road's right-of-way and Nottingdale Subdivision, a new residential section of Dale City.

The cemetery contains about eight markers, some dating to the mid-19th century. There may be other unmarked burials on this ridge created by drastic changes in the topography by the highway and subdivision construction. Some of the stones are toppled and the ground has been trampled.

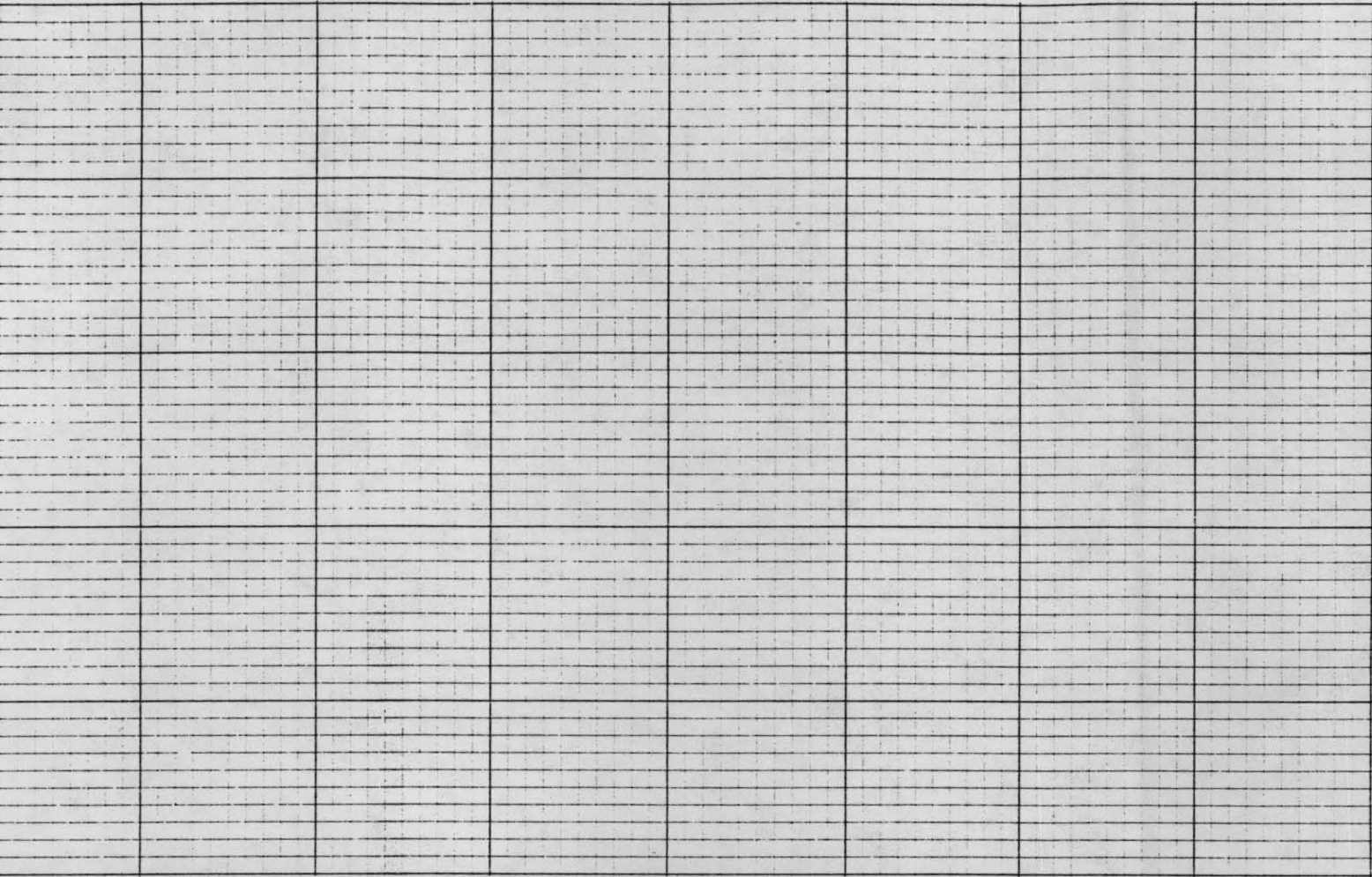
Historical significance (Chain of title; individuals, families, events, etc., associated with the property.)

The names on the stones are of the Reid family. The earliest marker stone dates to 1860, that of William Reid. According to the WPA guide to Prince William, a William Reid was among the soldiers from Prince William who served in the War of 1812. Aaron P. Reid, a Confederate Civil War veteran, is also buried there. The 1901 map of Prince William County shows a W. Reid residing near Hoadly Road at the head waters of Powells Branch, and a J. C. Reid in the vicinity of Smithfield School, off Spri ggs Road.

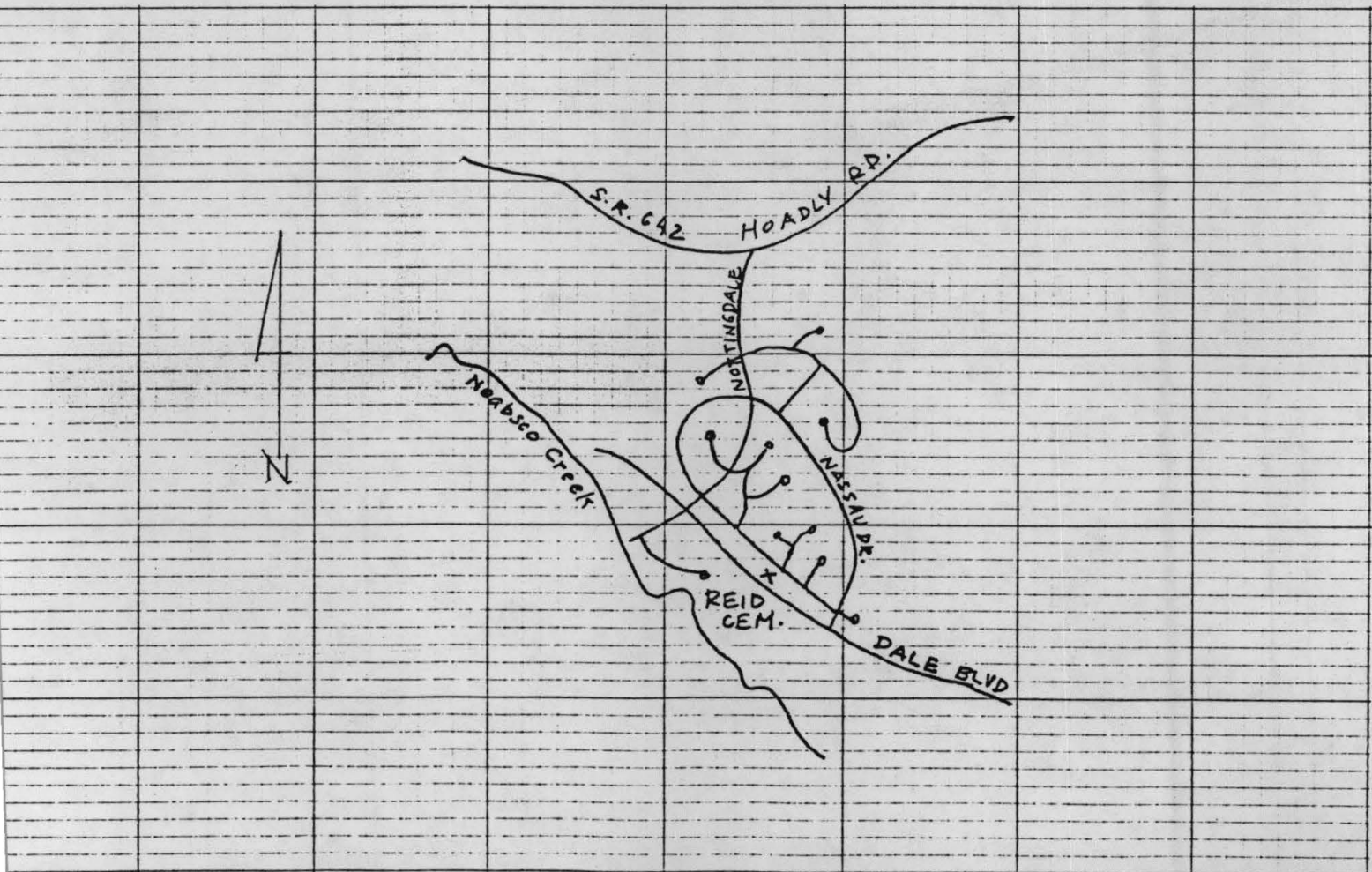
