This frame-constructed, brick veneered, 1-story Byzantine Catholic Church is a variation on the traditional country church erected in Northern Virginia, beginning in the late 1700's, and still, to some extent, being built in this area.

The church's distinguishing features are the onion dome atop a 4-sided traditional-looking frame tower, and the patriarchal, or archepiscopal, crosses attached to the dome, over the front entrance, and atop the roof over the altar end of the church.

Historical significance (Chain of title; individuals, families, events, etc., associated with the property.)

According to a newspaper article describing the church's history, the land for St. Mary's Church was donated by George Shutlack, and the church was constructed by John Shutlack. Mary's celebrated its 50th anniversary in 1975. The church was organized in about 1913-14, and constructed in 1925. "Big John" Shutlack is also credited as the builder of the icons and the great crucifix, and with finishing the interior of the dome.

A new sanctuary was built in the 1950's by the Cebula Brothers. In about 1967 the asphalt shingle-clad exterior was brick veneered.

This is a mission church whose charter is in the Ukranian arch-episcarchy in Philadelphia. A committee and trustees own and operate the Church. Services are held twice a month.

The Hoadly area in which St. Mary's Church is located became the home of several families of Eastern European immigrants who came to this country in about 1914, mainly from Poland, Czechoslovakia, Hungary, and The Ukraine.


